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
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
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The E.A. Christensen Collection

Einer Andreas Christensen, known as E.A. (1893-1969), was born in Copenhagen and educated at the Danish Politeknisk Laereanstalt, qualifying as a technical engineer.

As a young man he trained as a smith, giving him a lifelong appreciation of metalwork in all its forms, and in particular of antique weapons and armour. He established a small garage workshop and in time went on to invent several types of pumping machine, then had the good fortune to patent one of the first petrol pumps used by the major oil producers of the time. Some years later he acquired the engineering factory Waltrich a/s which specialised in precision engineering employing some fifty staff.

E.A.'s first acquisitions were African weapons (lots 1-7), found on his visits to Paris in the years prior to the first World War. Later his interests widened to include ancient edged weapons (lots 37-49) and oriental pieces (lots 8-21), and the collection grew significantly as a consequence of his extensive travels around Europe attending auctions and visiting dealers. His criteria were form and method of manufacture, hence his abiding interest in the Viking, Medieval and Renaissance swords for which the collection is famous.

He was a founder member of the Danish Arms and Armour Society and served on its Board of Directors from 1932 to 1937 and again after 1966. Pieces from his collection were first published in the Society's Yearbook for 1935, volume 1b, and a number of the earlier reference works on edged weapons draw on his collection.

E.A. was a very private family man who took immense pride in his collection which he displayed in elaborate arrangements around his home – not always with his wife's approval! His modesty about the collection is reflected in the fact that when asked about it he would always refer to it as 'old iron'.

As a dedicated *amateur d'armes* he would have been pleased to know that all now have this opportunity to acquire pieces from his collection.

The first with double-edged blade swelling towards the point and with shallow medial ridge along each side, and ivory grip of X-form sparsely punched with dots at the top on one side, in original tooled leather scabbard with twist leather arm thong; the second with double-edged spear-shaped blade with incised line decoration along both sides, waisted wooden grip bound with copper ribbon, and beak-shaped faceted iron pommel; the last with double-edged blade incised with lines converging toward the point on each side, and wooden grip of circular section entirely bound with leather strips and surmounted by a flat coneshaped iron pommel punched with a border of dots on both sides (3) 18.3 cm., 26 cm. and 22.7 cm. blades

The first with waisted double-edged blade swelling at the point and with medial line of copper along each side over half its length, both sides with a medial panel of punched and incised decoration, shouldered wooden grip covered with leather secured by plaited copper wire borders, a spherical arrangement of iron and copper bars above, and tall iron pommel of part octagonal section; the second with blade of similar form, pierced with three circular holes and with side-lugs at the forte, wooden grip bound with twisted brass wire, and beaked wooden pommel set with domed brass-headed nails (2) 46.5 cm. and 47.8 cm. blades

With wide flat single-edged blade hooked at the point and with a blunt projection above a short triangular projection on one side, fullered on one side at the forte and incised with notched lines over both sides, the back of the blade on each side with incised line decoration, wooden grip of flattened tapering section bound with an iron strap securing a rattan binding at the base, and wooden pommel turned to form three tiered compressed circles each set with domed brass-headed nails 42 cm. blade



The o-suriage blade with two mekugi-ana, midare hamon with tobiyaki, itame hada, the copper habaki chiselled and inlaid in gold, silver and shakudo on one side with an open fan and on the reverse with a pigeon, fully bound tsuka with shakudo-nanako fuchi-kashira decorated with chrysanthemum heads in gold and shibuichi, soft-metal menuki decorated en suite, and circular iron tsuba with shakudo rim chiselled with various samurai in a landscape, soft-metal details, full Soten signature and made at the age of 75, in its longitudinally ribbed black ishime lacquered saya

The blade with two mekugi-ana (one plugged) cut with a hi on each side, gonome-midare hamon with tobiyaki, itame hada, fully bound tsuka with shakudo-nanako fuchi and kabuto-gane decorated in gold with Kiri mon and Tomoe mon, shakudo and gold double mon menuki, and shakudo-nanako tachi tsuba, the dai-seppa decorated with gold mon, in its gold flecked lacquered saya decorated with chrysanthemum in gold lacquer with shakudo-nanako mounts decorated en suite with the tsuka

With tapering double-edged pattern-welded blade with characteristic gandja, gilt mendaq embossed and chased with stylised foliage, and wooden grip of Madara form carved and pierced with foliate designs, in original wooden scabbard with characteristic sarongan (minor chips), and white-metal pendoq embossed and chased with foliage along one side 31.5 cm. blade

With a pair of sharply-pointed blades each of stiff diamond section to the point, recessed over half their length on both sides and chiselled with a medial 'cyprus' tree issuing from a gilt fleur-de-lys, the forte on both sides chiselled with a gold-damascened floret against a punched ground, characteristic iron hilt decorated overall with gold-damascened flowering foliage (some loss of decoration and surface rust), and comprising tapering side-bars, and grip of four flat bars each swelling towards the centre 44.3 cm. overall

With slightly recurved single-edged blade cut with a narrow fuller along the back for most of its length on each side, both sides decorated along almost their entire length with inlaid silver foliage interrupted by roundels and framing panels of verses in Turkish script including the date, maker's name 'El Hajj Nuh' and the owner's name 'Ibrahim', a silver filigree mount over the forte on each side set with diamond shapes, pellets and a red coral bead, and characteristic silver hilt with grip-strap and 'eared' grip-scales en suite, the former set with eleven cabochon red corals, in original wooden scabbard covered in black leather with deep silver locket and chape each with foliate engraved borders, the former with small foliate suspension loop, the latter with monster-head terminal; together with a wooden yataghan scabbard covered in black leather with chased silver locket mount, and brass monster-head terminal (2) 58.5 cm. blade and 68 cm.



With curved finely watered single-edged blade with gold-inlaid number corresponding to 576, the forte on one side with two gold-inlaid cartouches (some wear) inscribed respectively in *na'staliq* script 'Sultan Hassan' and 'Work of Ali Isfahani', characteristic iron hilt finely inlaid overall with scrolling lotus blossoms within patterned silver borders, and comprising pointed foliate langets, waisted button quillons, curved tapering knuckle-guard with bud-shaped finial, disc-shaped pommel with budshaped finial on a pierced foliate dome, the finial carrying a pierced swivel for a tassel, and swelling grip of flattened diamond section, in original wooden scabbard covered in burgundy velvet (plush mostly worn off) with original chape en suite with the hilt 85.4 cm. blade

With slender tapering blade of deeply hollowed triangular section with central fuller over most of its length on the inner face, the forte etched on each face with formal scrollwork, the hilt comprising concave oval guard radially fluted inside and out and pierced with crosses around its outer edge, rear quillon, knuckle-guard, solid grip, and tall ovoidal pommel with button, decorated throughout with hollowed facets (gilding worn) 68.1 cm. blade

An Unusual Steel-Hilted Small-Sword Second Quarter Of The 18th Century, Perhaps Danish

With slender tapering double-edged blade of flattened diamond section at the forte and etched on each face of the central section with panels of running foliated scrollwork on a gilt ground on either side of a narrow central fuller, and on each face nearer the hilt with a heart-shaped panel above and beneath an oval panel containing a Classical trophy of arms on one face, and Classical profile bust on the other, all on a waved gilt ground (some wear and surface pitting throughout), the hilt of hunting sword form decorated with raised faceted features cut in imitation of brilliants and retaining traces of original blued finish, comprising downbent shell-guard with raised ovoidal central panel, baluster rear quillon, shaped knuckle-guard with central faceted knop between 'S's', fluted globose pommel en suite with the shell-guard, and swelling wooden grip bound with twisted steel wire between faceted collars 72.2 cm. blade

A German Silver-Hilted Small-Sword Circa 1750-60

With tapering double-edged blade of flattened hexagonal section (some wear) etched on each side with a symmetrical panel of scrolls against a hatched ground, and on the rounded forte with the figure of Fame holding a shield bearing the crowned monogram 'FR' (probably for King Frederick the Great of Prussia, 1712-1786), all above a rubbed inscription in German, hilt comprising pierced side-loop joined to the rear quillon and knuckle-guard, globular pommel with button, and swelling solid grip, cast and chased throughout with rococo ornament in relief, nearly all against a punched fishroe ground

26 A Fine French Small-Sword With Chiselled Steel Hilt Circa 1780

With burnished tapering blade of deeply hollowed triangular section, each face of the forte etched and gilt with small panels decorated with stars, scrolls, and trophies of arms, all originally on a blued ground, the panel on the inner side nearest the hilt etched with the bladesmith's initials 'ICI', the bright hilt (now partly russet) of characteristic form minutely decorated in relief on a matted ground with mount cavalrymen each within a raised oval frame, a fortification under siege, standing infantrymen, variously on parade and holding, loading and firing their muskets, and taking prisoners, the edges of the double-shell guard each chiselled with foliage centred on a winged monster-head, the rear quillion terminating in a lion's head with a globe in its mouth, the knuckle-guard with monster-head terminal and decorated with running scrollwork bearing flowers and foliage above and below a central standing figure on each side, respectively of an infant drummer and an infant figure of Mars, ovoidal pommel with baluster button, and swelling wooden grip bound with steel ribbon between twisted copper wire with a copper Turk's head top and bottom, in its original vellum-covered scabbard with bright steel mounts and two rings for suspension, the locket and chape each chiselled in relief on the outer side en suite with the hilt, and on the inner side with rococo ornament



A Swept-Hilt Rapier In Early 17th Century Style 19th Century

With slender tapering double-edged blade of hollow-ground flattened hexagonal section changing to flattened diamond towards the point, ricasso of rectangular section, each face struck with a pair of indistinct marks and bordered by a single incised line, russet iron hilt of slender rounded bars, comprising vertically recurved quillons each with ovoidal tip decorated in relief on the inner and outer side with a double-headed eagle within a niche, arms, three outer rings each with central knop en suite with the quillon-tips, the top ring joined by a curved bar to the knuckle-guard, the latter with central knop and finial both en suite with the guillon tips, inner guard of three merging curved bars rising to join the forward guillon, the centre of the guillon-block with a further chiselled double-headed eagle on each face, heavy barrel-shaped pommel with four raised double-headed eagles en suite, and swelling vertically fluted wooden grip between steel collars and reinforced with slender steel straps (the blade and hilt with scattered surface pitting) 113.5 cm. blade

The emigré corps of the Prince de Condé was formed in 1792 and placed in an Austrian Division under the command of Prince Esterhazy. The Corps was reformed in 1793 and fought in the campaigns of 1793-4 under the command of the Austrian Count Wurmser. In 1795 it received English subsidies and placed under the orders of various German princes, and subsequently in the Austrian Army taking part in the battle of Bibrach on 2 October 1796, before entering Russian service in 1797 and seeing action at the battle of Constance on 7 October 1799. The corps finally passed back into Austrian service in 1800. Following the Peace of Lunerville the corps was disbanded by order of the British government, and the surviving emigrés returned to France



The arms are those of Pierre Auguste Alphonese de Civille (1717-1772), chevalier, called 'Marquis de Civille', Seigneur de St. Mars etc., who married, in 1740, Maria Anne de Puysegur (1719-1796), daughter of Jacques de Chastenet, Marquis de Puysegur, and his wife Jeanne Henriette de Fourcy. Following a military career from 1731 until 1748 he was appointed Captain General of the coastguard of Dieppe on its formation in 1756

Claude Martin was born in 1735 in Lyons, the son of a cooper. He served with the French army 1752-60, when he deserted in India and joined the East India Company forces. Commissioned as Ensign in 1763, he was promoted Captain and appointed Superintendent of Artillery and Arsenals to the Nawab of Oudh. With the rank of Major he established the Lucknow Arsenal in 1779. Under his supervision and training a number of fine arms were produced by European and native armourers, examples of which are in the collections of the Royal Armouries, Leeds. This tour de force of the bronze founders art was possibly cast to adorn the gardens of the Villa Ludovisi which was bought from Cardinal Del Monte by Cardinal Ludovico Ludovisi and reconstructed in the 1620s to house his collection of Roman antiquities. The richness of the gardens, occupying an area that had been known as the Gardens of Sallust, was well-known, for, in 1828, Stenghal to declare the gardens among the most beautiful in the world. Due to financial troubles the last owner, Don Rudolfo Boncompagni Ludovisi, Prince of Piombino, sold the property to developers who divided the buildings and grounds into building lots, the gardens and renowned collections dispersed

The inscriptions seem to be purely imaginative as there does not appear to have been a battle of note in France or Italy in 1609. The ruling Prince of Piombino reigned from 1602 until 1611, and the legend of French occupation may refer to when Prince Antonio of Piombino (1778-1805) was deposed by invading French troops in 1799 and again in 1801. It is interesting to note that General Joachin Murat and his wife Caroline, nee Bonaparte, were rulers of Naples at this time, and another Bonaparte, Elisa, ruled in Lucca, having been made hereditary Princess of Piombino in 1805

The coat-of-arms appears to be based on that of Mellada of Dalmatia

In 1834 the distinguished French Urologist, Baron Charles Louis Stanislaus Heurteloup patented a gun in France and England which had a primer described as 'a small pipe or tube made of soft metal or other substance which may be easily divided, containing the priming'. This was housed in the butt of the gun and was automatically fed on to the nipple by a toothed wheel when the hammer was pulled back. The lock was the normal side-action type. In 1836 Heurteloup appears to have become aware of the previous Valdelion patent. After ensuring that it did not endanger his own patent, he promptly adopted its under-hammer action which he eulogised in a Mémoire sur les Fusils de Guerre, and gave his new gun the name Koptipeur (derived from the Greek words for to cut and strike). During 1837 improved models were patented in France and Scotland (the latter under the name of Thomas Theophilus Biggs). The following year a patent was taken out in Belgium in the name of J. Sigrist. Both were presumably agents of Heurteloup. Although the Koptipeur was rejected by the British Board of Ordnance after trails in 1837 it was adopted to a limited extent by the French and Belgian armies. Major-General Sir Herbert Stewart KCB ADC (1843-1885) was educated at Brighton and Winchester Colleges, before entering the Army in 1863. He served in India with the 37th Foot for ten years before exchanging into the 3rd Dragoon Guards. He was appointed a special service officer in Zululand in 1878, a turning point in his career which saw him rise from Captain to Major-General in just six years. He went on to serve as a staff officer to Sir Garnet Wolseley in the First Boer War and in the Sudan. It was while leading the relief of General Gordon at Khartoum that he was mortally wounded. In honour of his services memorials were placed in St. Paul's Cathedral and Hans Place. This revolver is believed to have been a gift to Stewart on his entering the army

to resell the *Lot* by auction, private treaty or any other means on giving seven days' written notice to you of the intention to resell;

to retain possession of the Lot;

to remove and store the Lot at your expense;

to take legal proceedings against you for any sum due under the *Contract for Sale* and/or damages for breach of contract;

to be paid interest on any monies due (after as well as before judgement or order) at the annual rate of 5% per annum above the base rate of National Westminster Bank Plc from time to time to be calculated on a daily basis from the date upon which such monies become payable until the date of actual payment;

to repossess the Lot (or any part thereof) which has not become your property, and for this purpose (unless the Buyer buys the Lot as a Consumer from the Seller selling in the course of a Business) you hereby grant an irrevocable licence to the Seller by himself and to his servants or agents to enter upon all or any of your premises (with or without vehicles) during normal Business hours to take possession of the Lot or part thereof;

On any resale of the *Lot* under paragraph 8.1.2, the *Seller* will account to you in respect of any balance remaining from any monies received by him or on his behalf in respect of the *Lot*, after the payment of all sums due to the *Seller* and to *Bonhams*, within 28 days of receipt of such monies by him or on his behalf.

THE SELLER'S LIABILITY

the Seller will not be liable for any loss of Business, Business profits or revenue or income or for loss of reputation or for disruption to Business or wasted time on the part of the Buyer or of the Buyer's management or staff or, for any indirect losses or consequential damages of any kind, irrespective in any case of the nature, volume or source of the loss or damage alleged to be suffered, and irrespective of whether the said loss or damage is caused by or claimed in respect of any negligence, other tort, breach of contract, statutory duty, restitutionary claim or otherwise:

in any circumstances where the Seller is liable to you in respect of the Lot, or any act, omission, statement, or representation in respect of it, or this agreement or its performance, and whether in damages, for an indemnity or contribution or for a restitutionary remedy or in any way whatsoever, the Seller's liability will be limited to payment of a sum which will not exceed by way of maximum the amount of the Purchase Price of the Lot irrespective in any case of the nature, volume or source of any loss or damage alleged to be suffered or sum claimed as due, and irrespective of whether the liability arises from any negligence, other tort, breach of contract, statutory duty, bailee's duty, restitutionary claim or otherwise.

- 10.12 Where the Contract for Sale confers an immunity from, and/or an exclusion or restriction of, the responsibility and/or liability of the Seller, it will also operate in favour and for the benefit of Bonhams, Bonhams' holding company and the subsidiaries of such holding company and the successors and assigns of Bonhams and of such companies and of any officer, employee and agent of Bonhams and such companies, each of whom will be entitled to rely on the relevant immunity and/or exclusion and/or restriction

within and for the purposes of Contracts (Rights of Third Parties) Act 1999, which enables the benefit of a contract to be extended to a person who is not a party to the contract, and generally at law.

11 GOVERNING LAW

All transactions to which the Contract for Sale applies and all connected matters will be governed by and construed in accordance with the laws of that part of the United Kingdom where the Sale takes place and the Seller and you each submit to the exclusive jurisdiction of the courts of that part of the United Kingdom, save that the Seller may bring proceedings against you in any other court of competent jurisdiction to the extent permitted by the laws of the relevant jurisdiction. Bonhams has a complaints procedure in place.

DEFINITIONS and GLOSSARY

Where these Definitions and Glossary are incorporated, the following words and phrases used have (unless the context otherwise requires) the meanings given to them below. The Glossary is to assist you to understand words and phrases which have a specific legal meaning with which you may not be familiar.

- "Additional Premium" a premium, calculated in accordance with the Notice to Bidders, to cover Bonhams' Expenses relating to the payment of royalties under the Artists Resale Right Regulations 2006 which is payable by the Buyer to Bonhams on any Lot marked [AR] which sells for a Hammer Price which together with the Buyer's Premium (but excluding any VAT) equals or exceeds 1,000 euros (converted into the currency of the Sale using the European Central Bank Reference rate prevailing on the date of the Sale).
- "Auctioneer" the representative of Bonhams conducting the Sale.
- "Bidder" a person who has completed a Bidding Form
- "Bidding Form" our Bidding Registration Form, our Absentee Bidding Form or our Telephone Bidding Form.
- "Bonhams" Bonhams 1793 Limited or its successors or assigns. Bonhams is also referred to in the Buyer's Agreement, the Conditions of Business and the Notice to Bidders by the words "we", "us" and "our".
 "Book" a printed Book offered for Sale at a specialist
- "Business" includes any trade, Business and profession.
 "Buyer" the person to whom a Lot is knocked down by the
- Auctioneer. The Buyer is also referred to in the Contract for Sale and the Buyer's Agreement by the words "you" and
- "Buyer's Agreement" the contract entered into by Bonhams
- with the Buyer (see Appendix 2 in the Catalogue).
 "Buyer's Premium" the sum calculated on the Hammer Price at the rates stated in the Notice to Bidders.
 "Catalogue" the Catalogue relating to the relevant Sale, including any representation of the Catalogue published on
- our Website.
 "Commission" the Commission payable by the Seller to Bonhams calculated at the rates stated in the Contract Form. "Condition Report" a report on the physical condition of a Lot provided to a Bidder or potential Bidder by Bonhams on
- behalf of the Seller.
 "Conditions of Sale" the Notice to Bidders, Contract for Sale,
- Buyer's Agreement and Definitions and Glossary.
 "Consignment Fee" a fee payable to Bonhams by the Seller calculated at rates set out in the Conditions of Business.
- "Consumer" a natural person who is acting for the relevant purpose outside his trade, *Business* or profession. "Contract Form" the *Contract Form*, or vehicle *Entry* form, as
- applicable, signed by or on behalf of the Seller listing the Lots to be offered for sale by Bonhams.
 "Contract for Sale" the Sale contract entered into by the
- Seller with the Buyer (see Appendix 1 in the Catalogue). "Contractual Description" the only Description of the Lot (being that part of the Entry about the Lot in the Catalogue which is in bold letters, any photograph (except for the colour) and the contents of any *Condition Report*) to which the *Seller* undertakes in the Contract of Sale the Lot corresponds.
- "Description" any statement or representation in any way descriptive of the *Lot*, including any statement or representation relating to its authorship, attribution, condition, provenance, authenticity, style, period, age, suitability, quality, origin, value, estimated selling price (including the *Hammer Price*).
- "Entry" a written statement in the Catalogue identifying the Lot and its Lot number which may contain a Description and illustration(s) relating to the Lot.
- "Estimate" a statement of our opinion of the range within which the hammer is likely to fall.
- "Expenses" charges and Expenses paid or payable by Bonhams in respect of the *Lot* including legal *Expenses*, banking charges and *Expenses* incurred as a result of an electronic transfer of money, charges and Expenses for loss and damage cover, insurance, Catalogue and other reproductions and illustrations, any customs duties, advertising, packing or shipping costs, any customs duties, advertising, packing or shipping costs, reproductions rights' fees, taxes, levies, costs of testing, searches or enquiries, preparation of the Lot for Sale, storage charges, removal charges, removal charges or costs of collection from the Seller as the Seller's agents or from a defaulting Buyer, plus VAT if applicable.

 "Forgery" an imitation intended by the maker or any other person to deceive as to authorship, attribution, origin, authenticity, style, date, age, period, provenance, culture, source or composition which at the date of the Sale had a
- source or composition, which at the date of the Sale had a

value materially less than it would have had if the *Lot* had not been such an imitation, and which is not stated to be such an imitation in any description of the Lot. A Lot will not be a Forgery by reason of any damage to, and/or restoration and/or modification work (including repainting or over painting) having been carried out on the *Lot*, where that damage, restoration or modification work (as the case may be) does not substantially affect the identity of the Lot as one conforming to the description of the *Lot*.

"Guarantee" the obligation undertaken personally by

Bonhams to the Buyer in respect of any Forgery and, in the case of specialist Stamp Sales and/or specialist Book Sales, a Lot made up of a Stamp or Stamps or a Book or Books as set out in

- the Buyer's Agreement.
 "Hammer Price" the price in the currency in which the Sale is conducted at which a Lot is knocked down by the Auctioneer. "Loss and Damage Warranty" means the warranty described in paragraph 8.2 of the Conditions of Business.
- "Loss and Damage Warranty Fee" means the fee described in paragraph 8.2.3 of the Conditions of Business.
 "Lot" any item consigned to *Bonhams* with a view to its *Sale*
- at auction or by private treaty (and reference to any Lot will include, unless the context otherwise requires, reference to individual items comprised in a group of two or more items offered for Sale as one Lot).
- Motoring Catalogue Fee" a fee payable by the Seller to Bonhams in consideration of the additional work undertaken by Bonhams in respect of the cataloguing of motor vehicles and in respect of the promotion of *Sales* of motor vehicles.
- "New Bond Street" means Bonhams' saleroom at 101
- New Bond Street, London W1S 1SR. "Notional Charges" the amount of *Commission* and *VAT* which would have been payable if the *Lot* had been sold at the Notional Price
- "Notional Fee" the sum on which the Consignment Fee payable to Bonhams by the Seller is based and which is calculated according to the formula set out in the Conditions
- "Notional Price" the latest in time of the average of the high and low *Estimates* given by us to you or stated in the *Catalogue* or, if no such *Estimates* have been given or stated, the *Reserve* applicable to the *Lot*.

 "Notice to Bidders" the notice printed at the back or front of
- our Catalogues.
- "Purchase Price" the aggregate of the Hammer Price and VAT on the Hammer Price.
- "Reserve" the minimum price at which a Lot may be sold (whether at auction or by private treaty). "Sale" the auction Sale at which a Lot is to be offered for Sale
- "Sale Proceeds" the net amount due to the Seller from the Sale of a Lot, being the Hammer Price less the Commission, any VAT chargeable thereon, Expenses and any other amount due to us in whatever capacity and howsoever arising.
- "Seller" the person who offers the Lot for Sale named on the Contract Form. Where the person so named identifies on the form another person as acting as his agent, or where the person named on the Contract Form acts as an agent for a principal (whether such agency is disclosed to Bonhams or not), "Seller" includes both the agent and the principal who shall be jointly and severally liable as such. The Seller is also referred to in the Conditions of Business by the words "you" and "your". "Specialist Examination" a visual examination of a Lot by a
- specialist on the *Lot*.
 "Stamp" means a postage *Stamp* offered for *Sale* at a Specialist Stamp Sale.
- "Standard Examination" a visual examination of a Lot by a non-specialist member of Bonhams' staff.
- "Storage Contract" means the contract described in paragraph 8.3.3 of the Conditions of Business or paragraph 4.4 of the *Buyer's Agreement* (as appropriate).
- "Storage Contractor" means the company identified as such in the Catalogue.
 "Terrorism" means any act or threatened act of terrorism,
- whether any person is acting alone or on behalf of or in connection with any organisation(s) and/or government(s), committed for political, religious or ideological or similar purposes including, but not limited to, the intention to influence any government and/or put the public or any section of the public into fear.
 "Trust Account" the bank account of Bonhams into which all
- sums received in respect of the Purchase Price of any Lot will be paid, such account to be a distinct and separate account to Bonhams' normal business bank account.
- "VAT" value added tax at the prevailing rate at the date of the Sale in the United Kingdom.
 "Website" Bonhams Website at www.bonhams.com.
- "Withdrawal Notice" the Seller's written notice to Bonhams revoking Bonhams' instructions to sell a Lot.
 "Without Reserve" where there is no minimum price at which
- a Lot may be sold (whether at auction or by private treaty)

GLOSSARY

The following expressions have specific legal meanings with which you may not be familiar. The following glossary is intended to give you an understanding of those expressions but is not intended to limit their legal meanings:-

- "artist's resale right": the right of the creator of a work of art to receive a payment on Sales of that work subsequent to the original Sale of that work by the creator of it as set out in the
- Artists Resale Right Regulations 2006.

 "bailee": a person to whom goods are entrusted.

 "indemnity": an obligation to put the person who has
 the benefit of the indemnity in the same position in which he would have been, had the circumstances giving rise to the indemnity not arisen and the expression "indemnify"is
- construed accordingly.

 "interpleader proceedings": proceedings in the Courts to determine ownership or rights over a *Lot*.
- "knocked down": when a Lot is sold to a Bidder, indicated by the fall of the hammer at the Sale.
- "lien": a right for the person who has possession of the Lot to
- retain possession of it.

 "risk": the possibility that a Lot may be lost, damaged, destroyed, stolen, or deteriorate in condition or value.

 "title": the legal and equitable right to the ownership of a Lot.

 "tort": a legal wrong done to someone to whom the wrong doer has a duty of care.

SALE OF GOODS ACT 1979

The following is an extract from the Sale of Goods Act 1979:

"Section 12 Implied terms about title, etc

- In a contract of sale, other than one to which subsection (3) below applies, there is an implied term on the part of the seller that in the case of a sale he has a right to sell the goods, and in the case of an agreement to sell he will have such a right at the time when the property is to pass.
- (2) In a contract of sale, other than one to which subsection (3) below applies, there is also an implied term that-
 - (a) the goods are free, and will remain free until the time when the property is to pass, from any charge or encumbrance not disclosed or known to the buyer before the contract is made, and
 - (b) the buyer will enjoy quiet possession of the goods except in so far as it may be disturbed by the owner or other person entitled to the benefit of any charge or encumbrance so disclosed or
- (3) This subsection applies to a contract of sale in the case of which there appears from the contract or is to be inferred from its circumstances an intention that the seller should transfer only such title as he or a third person may have
- In a contract to which subsection (3) above applies there is an implied term that all charges or encumbrances known to the seller and not (4)known to the buyer have been disclosed to the buyer before the contract is made.
- (5) In a contract to which subsection (3) above applies there is also an implied term that none of the following will disturb the buyer's quiet possession of the goods, namely-
 - (a) the seller;
 - (b) in a case where the parties to the contract intend that the seller should transfer only such title as a third person may have, that person;
 - (c) anyone claiming through or under the seller or that third person otherwise than under a charge or encumbrance disclosed or known to the buyer before the contract is made
 - As regards England and Wales and Northern Ireland, the term implied by subsection (1) above is a condition and the terms implied by subsections (2), (4) and (5) above are warranties."
