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EUROPEAN GLASS FROM THE COLLECTION OF LIUBA AND ERNESTO WOLF

"I met Ernesto and Liuba Wolf in Brazil in 1969. at the introduction of the museum director and art historian Werner Schmalenbach. Entering the home of Ernesto and Liuba, I was overwhelmed by the diversity and quality of the works they had amassed: illuminated manuscripts and rare books, ancient and contemporary glass, tribal art/ and modern paintings, drawings and sculpture. It was in the latter category that I had the privilege to advise them. Liuba, a sculptor herself and student of Germaine Richier, also developed a distinct and powerful visual vocabulary of her own. She was the first contemporary artist I showed in my London gallery. I remember her extraordinary animal forms staged throughout the garden and the house, which remains, in my mind, the habitat of true connoisseurs. When I asked Ernesto how he managed to collect such extraordinary works of art, he replied, "Whenever I am offered works of interest and sense the price is right, I do not bargain. I want to be the first in a dealer's mind when a truly special work comes along. When I feel the price is not right. I simply abstain."

For Ernesto and Liuba Wolf, what began as a mere interest in poetry, literature and fine art evolved into a lifelong passion for visual culture. While their areas of interest ranged widely, the crux of their collection were masterworks and decorative arts with the finest craftsmanship and artistic achievement. Assembled over the course of six decades, this vast and eclectic collection came to include Byzantine and Medieval glass, antiquarian books, 20th century masterworks, ethnographic art, antiquities and other curiosities that piqued their interest.

Born in Stuttgart, Ernesto Wolf (1918-2003) left Germany for Buenos Aires with his family prior to the outbreak of World War II and on to Brazil a few years later, where he became a very successful textile and furniture industrialist. The 1950s and 60s proved to be an especially acquisitive and meaningful period for Ernesto, both personally and as a patron of the arts. It was during this time that he met his future wife, Liuba (née Boyadjieva) and co-founded the Museum of Modern Art and the Sao Luis Gallery in support of Brazilian artists. Bulgarianborn sculptor Liuba Wolf (1923- 2005) trained with the famed postwar sculptor Germaine Richier in Paris, later achieving success and recognition in her own right. Together, Ernesto and Liuba Wolf, were a quiet, but formidable presence in the art world: discreetly assembling, exhibiting, discussing and enjoying their extraordinary collection over the course of a lifetime.

A GREEN TINTED 'MAIGELEIN', GERMAN, LATE 15TH OR EARLY 16TH CENTURY

The early pattern-moulded cup of rounded form with cross-ribbed spiralling decoration and a high kick-in base, *6.3cm high* (broken and restuck, some losses)

Small cross-ribbed drinking bowls or beakers known as *Maigeleins* were popular in the 15th and early 16th centuries and were typically used for drinking wine or spirits. The term 'Maigelein' first appeared in reference to glass vessels in a 1462 inventory of Sigmundsburg Castle in the Tirol (*ii maygölgläsel*). They were produced from 'forest glass' in large numbers, but few intact examples survive. The pattern was produced by blowing a glob of molten glass into a ribbed mould, removing and twisting it, then reinserting it into the mould once more and twisting it in the opposite direction. Similar examples are illustrated by Jet-Pijzel-Dommisse and Titus Eliëns, Glinsterend Glas (2009), p. 30, cats. 6-9 and by Birgit and Dieter Schaich, Reine Formsache (2007), p. 78, cat. 61.

A RARE LARGE GREEN TINTED BERKEMEYER, DUTCH OR GERMAN, LATE 16TH OR 17TH CENTURY

The flared bowl merging into a cylindrical lower section applied with two rows of four large, smooth watery prunts beneath a trailed thread, the foot applied with a spun footring, high kick-in-base, *14.5cm high*, owner's accession number *17* inscribed in black ink on the base

The linguistic origins of the name 'Berkemeyer' lie in the Northern Netherlands, although the majority of Berkemeyers in the Netherlands were the products of German workshops. Berkemeyers were originally produced as wooden beakers with lids carved from the branch of a birch tree (a 'berkemei'). The prunts on the stem were considered reminiscent of the rough bark, hence the name association. Together with Roemers, Berkemeyers were the preferred vessels for the consumption of wine and feature frequently in 17th and 18th century still life paintings by the Dutch Masters. As with Roemers, the prunts on their stem provided a secure grip during feasting, preventing them from slipping from greasy hands. Their increasing size was a result of technical advancements in glass production rather than increasing alcohol consumption, with large examples such as this usually reserved for special occasions in which the glass was filled and passed around for drinking and toasting.

I (1993), pp. 129-132, cats. 179-186, and by Brigitte Klesse, Kunstgewerbemuseum der Stadt Köln: Glas (1963), p. 68, cat. 99. For a similar example see Anna-Elisabeth Theuerkauff-Liederwald, 'Der Römer', Journal of Glass Studies 10 (1968), p. 132, fig. 15. Very similar Berkemeyers have been sold by Christie's Amsterdam, 5 July 1989, The Guepin Collection, lot 6, and by Sotheby's London, 14 November 1995, The Joseph Ritman Collection, lot 7. See also the two examples in the Overduin Collection offered by Bonhams, 21 May 2014, lots 22 and 23. A Berkemeyer of similar size formerly in the Ritman Collection was sold by Sotheby's, 14 November 1995, lot 8, and was later sold by Bonhams, 2 May 2013, The Mühleib Collection, lot 48.

A RARE GREEN TINTED JUG, GERMAN, 17TH CENTURY

The globular form applied with a trailed milled spiralling band, the tall cylindrical neck similarly applied with a pair of trailed milled bands and a ribbed scroll handle with thumb spur, kick-in base, *17cm high*, owner's accession number *21856* inscribed on the base in white ink (scratched)

Provenance The Liuba and Ernesto Wolf Collection Milled bands on jugs of this type are very rare, although parallels are found on a number of other contemporary German glass vessels, most notably the Passglas and Bandwurmglas, but also on the roemer and thumb glass (Daumenglas). A very similar jug, but made of blue glass with an applied footring and no milling to the trailed band, is illustrated by Birgit and Dieter Schaich, Reine Formsache (2007), p. 166, cat. 209. Another in translucent yellow-green glass, also with an applied foot and no milling to the trailed band, is in the Museum für angewandte Kunst, Frankfurt, accession no. X 5109/4858 (see the catalogue, Europäisches und Aussereuropäisches Glas (1980), p. 102, cat. 215). A jug of similar colour and shape, but with no trailed band to the body and an applied footring, is again illustrated by Schaich (2007), p. 166, cat. 208.

A CLEAR GLASS ROEMER, PROBABLY GERMAN, LATE 17TH OR EARLY 18TH CENTURY

The generous cup-shaped bowl with base forming a hollow stem, the stem applied with three rows of three raspberry prunts below a milled band, set on a tall hollow spreading foot with a folded footrim, kick-in base, *21.7cm high*

Roemers, like Berkemeyers, were preferred for the drinking of wine. Large examples such as this were reserved for special occasions, when the glass would be passed around the company from hand to hand. The prunts on the stem were functional as well as decorative, as they provided a better grip for greasy hands in a time when cutlery was not commonly used for feasting. The custom of drinking from a single glass such as this when welcoming or bidding farewell to guests, or toasting to someone's health, was a custom that survived well into the 17th century. The vast majority of Roemers in the Netherlands were imported from Germany as Dutch workshops could not meet the demand. The use of Roemers was generally restricted to the relatively wealthy and they feature commonly in still life paintings of the 16th and 17th centuries by the Dutch Masters. Whilst the green-tinted examples are relatively common, it is far rarer to find examples such as this in clear glass. It has been suggested that roemers of this type in clear glass, with a high foot, probably originated in North Germany, as suggested by the style of the decoration on engraved examples (see Pieter van Eck and Henrica Zijlstra-Zweens, Glass in the Rijksmuseum, vol. I (1993), p. 150).

Very similar roemers in clear glass are in The Metropolitan Museum of Art, accession no. 27.185.108, and in the Rijksmuseum, illustrated by van Eck and Zijlstra-Zweens (1993), pp. 150-151, cat. 217. An example with wheel engraving is again in the Rijksmuseum, illustrated by Pieter van Eck, Glass in the Rijksmuseum, Vol. II (1995), p. 215, cat. 228. Another similar example was formerly in the collection of the Wunsch Foundation, sold at Christie's, 8 January 2013, lot 262. See also the example from The Allaire Collection in The Cloisters Museum, New York, accession no. 45E. A roemer in clear glass but of different shape is in Brooklyn Museum, accession no. 2001.94.1. Two roemers in clear glass but again of different shape were sold by Christie's, 5 March 2013, lot 207.

The globular form with tall neck and everted rim, moulded with vertical ribs spiralling slightly at the neck, slight kick-in base, 24.1cm high

A GREEN GLASS 'STANGENGLAS' WITH TRAILED DECORATION, PROBABLY LATE 19TH CENTURY

Following medieval traditions, of tapering beaker shape, the lower part trailed with vertical rows of individual prunts and zigzags, above a small spun foot and kick-in base, *25cm high*

A FINE RUBINGLAS BEAKER AND COVER WITH WHEEL-CUT DECORATION, EARLY 18TH CENTURY

Of shouldered faceted form, the body decorated with a band of knotted ribbons from which is suspended stylised foliage and bunches of fruit including apples, grapes and pears, the flat mushroom cover similarly faceted and decorated with stylised fruit and foliage, 13.1cm high (the base and lid inscribed with inventory numbers *GI* 464 in white ink, the lid also inscribed *VIII* 352 in red ink) (2)

A covered Rubinglas beaker with silver-gilt mounts decorated with comparable tied ribbons and bunches of grapes is in the British Museum, accession no. A RARE VENETIAN MILLEFIORI BALL OR SPHERE, 16TH CENTURY OR EARLY 17TH CENTURY

The millefiori core set within clear glass and formed from an assortment of composite canes in blue, red, green, white, turquoise and yellow and with a small gold foil inclusion, *the ball 3.5cm diam*,, pierced through the centre and mounted on a gilt metal pedestal and surmounted with a gilded figure of a Bacchic boy on a barrel, *12.9cm high overall* (the glass ball fractured)

The simple domed shape set with an assortment of composite 'canes' in vibrant colours, *the handle 5cm long (cracked and restuck)*, later mounted as the handle of a curious silver wedge-shaped object

A FRENCH LAMPWORK SCENT BOTTLE AND STOPPER, 17TH CENTURY

Perhaps Nevers or Orleans, of disk form on a spreading foot, formed from tiny scales of gold foil glass and set with simulated gems in turquoise and black, the reverse textured in black glass, the stopper as a tiny basket of fruit, *9.8cm overall height* (lacking handles and other losses) (2)

Each of compressed cup-shaped form with a pair of drawn handles, the bases moulded with gadroons, set on small circular feet, three of the jardinières filled with brightly-coloured glass flowers mounted in wax, the fourth jardinière empty, *the jardinieres 3.6cm high* (losses to one handle, minor losses to flowers) (4)

A REMARKABLE VENETIAN LAMPWORK FIGURE FRAGMENT AND TWO OTHER FRAGMENTARY FIGURES, 17TH CENTURY

The upper part of a larger figure formed of coloured glass over a wire frame and clay core, the *commedia dell' arte* or masque figure perhaps representing il Capitano, in colourful costume decorated with ribbon bows, his bearded face in a distinctive lavender colour, *8.2cm high*, together with two other smaller figure fragments of related type depicting a man in a ragged cape and a man with his head bandaged, *6.7cm and 6.1cm* (3)

This incomplete figure is remarkably similar to the celebrated group in the Danish royal collection at Rosenborg, also made of lampwork over a wire frame and undoubtedly by the same maker or workshop as the present lot. The Rosenborg group, illustrated by Gudmund Boesen, Venetianske Glas pa Rosenborg (1960), p. 15, depicts two *commedia dell' arte* figures playing a game of morra (a wager game involving their fingers). This group was bought by King Frederick IV in 1670 from the Danish painter Karel van Mander who had lived in Italy in 1636-38. In their catalogue of Glass in the Robert Lehman Collection (1993), Dwight Lanmon and David Whitehouse suggest this is from the same workshop as three single figures in the Kunsthistorisches Museum in Vienna, said to have come from the gallery in Ambras, the castle of Archduke Ferdinand of Tyrol near Innsbruck.







A FINE VENETIAN LATTICINIO WINE GLASS, CIRCA 1540-60

Decorated in *vetro a fili* and *a retorti*, the flared trumpet bowl with vertical ribs below two trailed bands, set on a flattened knop between clear mereses, over a high folded conical foot, *18.6cm high*

A SMALL VENETIAN OR FAÇON DE VENISE LATTICINIO GOBLET, LATE 16TH CENTURY

Decorated in *vetro a fili* and *a retorti*, the slender tapering waisted bowl with slightly everted rim and three graduating constrictions to the lower part, set on a domed and folded foot, *14.9cm high*

A goblet of similar form but much larger is in the James A. de Rothschild Collection at Waddesdon Manor. In their catalogue of the Rothschild Collection (1977), pp. 104-107 Robert Charleston and Michael Archer discuss many related examples and the question of whether all originally had covers. They reproduce a drawing of a vessel of related shape, without a cover, from the mid-16th century catalogue of the Colinet glassworks at Beauwelz, there described as 'Verres Coquilles'. Goblets of comparable form, but again much larger than that in the present lot, have been sold by Bonhams, 11 December 2013, lot 62 and 17 December 2008, lot 407.



A LARGE VENETIAN FOOTED BOWL, CIRCA 1500

The deep bowl moulded around the lower part with fourteen spiralling ribs, the folded rim enclosing a translucent blue trail, set on a high ribbed spreading foot with an upturned folded footrim in translucent dark-blue, *30.7cm diam* (tiny chip to footrim)

A RARE AND EARLY DOUBLE WINE GLASS AND TABLE BELL COMBINED, SECOND HALF 17TH CENTURY

Probably Liège, the two bell-shaped bowls in graduated sizes moulded around their lower parts with 'nip't diamond waies' beneath a single thin trail, the larger bowl containing a suspended clapper, the bowls linked by a stem section formed from a hollow inverted baluster and an angular knop between multiple collars, *25.2cm high*

19 * AN EXCEPTIONAL EARLY SILVERED GOBLET OR CHALICE, 17TH CENTURY

The round funnel bowl enclosing a layer of silver foil, set on a hollow ovoid or egg-shaped stem between mereses above a short plain section, over a spreading folded foot, *18cm high* (broken through stem and restuck)

Barrington Haynes, Glass Through the Ages (1964), p. 153, pl. 53a. Its history prior to the 1960s is not recorded but it comes with a fitted box that probably dates from the 19th century. The goblet has the appearance of having been excavated. The late Christopher Sheppard attributed it to England in the Mansell period. The plain shape certainly resembles English silver goblets from the early 17th century.

Metallic foil inclusion within the bowl of a glass is a Venetian technique that is very rarely encountered, especially in silver rather than gold. Foil had been used in the traditions of *façon de Venise* in the stems of early English glass since the period of Verzelini. A well-known goblet incorporating gold foil decoration in the bowl is in the British Museum, perhaps from the southern Netherlands, illustrated by Hugh Tait, The Golden Age of Venetian Glass (1979), p. 38 and pl. 8, cat. 29. No comparable example with an entirely silver bowl appears to be recorded.



A RARE EARLY GLASS TAZZA, PROBABLY ENGLISH MANUFACTURE, CIRCA 1665-70

Perhaps from the Duke of Buckingham's Glasshouse, in very thin and fine soda metal with a slight brownish-grey tint, the plain shallow curved top raised on a spreading foot folded at the base rim, *17.7cm diam*, *6cm*-6.3*cm high*

In Autumn 1948 a collection of early glass appeared for sale at Christie's in London and although offered anonymously, it was disclosed the glass was consigned from Wentworth Woodhouse. The entire collection was purchased by Churchill's and details were published in their Glass Notes no. 9, December 1949, pp.11-19.

The parcel of early glass consigned from Wentworth Woodhouse included no less than three posset pots all bearing the seal mark of Ravenscroft, as well as three other posset pots in the same colour of metal as this tazza. This was one of nine tazzas of similar shape in the collection together with one larger tazza and two plates. Writing in his Churchill's Glass Notes, E Barrington Haynes ascribed all these pieces to a single service and he listed precise measurements for each tazza. Barrington Haynes realised most of the tazzas retained faint traces of gilding around the borders or centres and he felt this represented English gilding from the Restoration period.

One example from this set of tazzas from Wentworth Woodhouse is now in the Corning Museum of Glass, accession no. 2014.2.1, sold by Christie's, 3 December 2013, lot 166. Another example from The Tillou Collection was sold by Christie's New York, 28 January 2010, lot 190.

The helmet-shaped bowl decorated in *vetro a fili* and *a retorti* with opaque-white twists and ribbons, with an applied folded-over rim in clear glass, a small pinched pouring lip and an applied spirally ribbed s-scroll handle also in clear glass, set on a clear quatrefoil knop between collars and a spreading foot with a folded rim, *13.8cm high*

This jug is closely related in form to the example in the Cecil Higgins Museum, Bedford, which bears an applied raven's head seal at the base of the handle. The Cecil Higgins jug, reproduced here (fig.1) is unquestionably English in origin and was produced by George Ravenscroft circa 1676-77. The similarity in the appearance of this and the present jug is discussed by Lanmon (2011), p. 61, fig. 31 and by Christopher Sheppard and John Smith, Glass from the Restoration to the Regency (1990), p. 11. The marked Ravenscroft jug is not a latticinio example and is instead produced entirely from clear glass

with ribbing. The very close similarities in form suggest that the present lot is also of English manufacture. The spirally ribbed handle is very unusual and appears to be a particularly English feature found only on jugs of this type. Another clear glass jug, very similar to the Cecil Higgins Museum example but slightly taller, is in the Victoria and Albert Museum, accession no. C.528-1936, and is illustrated by W. B. Honey, Glass (1946), pl. 51b.

The jug in the present lot was analysed by portable X-ray fluorescence under the auspices of the Corning Museum of Glass and the results published by Lanmon (2011), pp. 316-322. This established that it is of a potash-soda-silica composition containing an addition of approximately 5% lead oxide. Glass of this type was produced by adding to the silica component heavily refined (lixivated) sodarich plant ash, together with a small quantity of lead. Purification of the plant ash by lixivation ensured that salts and impurities such as iron, which would have had a detrimental effect on the quality of the glass (for example, producing a green tint), were removed. However, components which stabilise the glass, such as lime, were also removed in this process and this rendered the glass susceptible to crizzling. Lead was presumably added in an attempt to prevent crizzling, but without an additional stabiliser such as lime, this would have been unsuccessful. The opaque-white latticinio threads are opacified by calcium antimonate, produced through the addition of antimony in oxygen-rich furnace conditions.

The results of Corning museum's analysis of this jug have been corroborated by a recent XRF examination carried out for Bonhams by Cranfield University's LARA. Whilst the composition of the glass used by Ravenscroft remains unclear, the unusual composition of this jug suggests that it may be an early experimental piece.



This glass is one of a rare group of early pro-Hanoverian glasses probably made to celebrate the Coronation of King George I in 1714. Lanmon (2011), p. 156, states that there are at least twelve surviving panel-moulded glasses of this type with crowns on the shoulders, but without inscriptions. The crowns appear to be a precursor of the diamond studs or stars usually found on moulded stems, see Robert Charleston, English Glass (1984), pp. 145-146.

A glass of very similar shape moulded with crowns on the stem but without diamonds, is illustrated by L. M. Bickerton, 18th Century English Drinking Glasses (1986), p. 125, no. 291. A glass moulded with both crowns and diamonds to the stem, but with a round funnel bowl, was in the A.C. Hubbard Collection, illustrated by Ward Lloyd, A Wine Lover's Glasses (2000), pp. 28 and 90, pl. 123 and was sold by Bonhams, 30 November 2011, lot 53. Another moulded with both crowns and diamonds, but with a conical bowl, was sold by Bonhams, 17 December 2008, lot 264. It is likely that the large crown, together with the throne, is symbolic of Mary as Queen of Heaven.

It is rare to find acorn-knopped goblets of such large size, even without engraved decoration. Compare to the massive acorn-knopped goblet from the Basil Jefferies Collection, sold by Bonhams 12 November 2014, lot 22. Another massive acorn-knopped goblet was in the A.C. Hubbard Collection, illustrated by Ward Lloyd, A Wine Lover's Glasses (2000), p. 29, pl. 13. This was sold by Bonhams, 30 November 2011, lot 44.



The Book of Samuel describes David's ascent to power and the covenant he formed with Jonathan. David, depicted here with a harp, was famed for his musical ability and he was summoned to play for King Saul. 

The inscription 'No Excise' refers to the Cider Bill of 1763 which imposed a tax of four shillings on every cask of cider. A comparable cider goblet was in the Meyer Collection, sold by Bonhams 1 May 2013, lot 48. Further examples bearing similar decoration and the same inscription were in the Basil Jefferies Collection, Bonhams 12 November 2014, lot 58, and in the Ron and Mary Thomas Collection, Bonhams 4 June 2008, lot 174. 

The bell bowl finely engraved with a standing rhinoceros, the stem set on a multi-ply airtwist corkscrew encircled by a single translucent blue spiral thread, over a conical foot, *17.5cm high* (minute annealing fractures in the foot)

The rhinoceros was something of a novelty in the 18th century. The animal became famous in England during the 1740s particularly, thanks to the *grand tour* of 'Clara', the most celebrated specimen of a rhinoceros. Between 1741 and 1758 Clara was toured around Europe and caused a sensation, leading to the publication of images and prints to celebrate the occasion. As a result, images of rhinos became highly fashionable in the 18th century. A Chelsea porcelain dish decorated with an image of a rhino is in the Untermyer Collection in the Metropolitan Museum of Art, and two similarly decorated Meissen serving dishes can be found in the Duke of Northumberland Service at Alnwick Castle. No other wine glass with this remarkable decoration is recorded, however.

This glass and the following two lots are part of a series of very similar glasses combining blue mixed-colour-twist stems with bell bowls engraved with large single animals. An example engraved with a prancing stag was sold by Sotheby's, 18 December 2002, lot 119. Another engraved with a jumping hare was offered for sale by Scottish Antiques Inc. These glasses with animals may all have come from a single set. Another set with the same shape of bowls and identical stems is recorded engraved with single botanical specimens. A glass with a spray of lilies was sold by Bonhams 19 May 2010, lot 79 and another from the Tatton Hewetson Collection engraved with a single tulip on 13 November 2013, lot 55. An unengraved example was also sold by Bonhams, 2 June 2004, lot 86.

The inscription on this goblet is taken from a poem written by Dirk Smits in 1740 (see Dirk Smits, Gedichten (1740), p. 231 and also F. Smit, A Concise Catalogue of Eighteenth-Century Wine-Glasses Wheel-Engraved and Signed by Jacob Sang (1992), p. 12 for a brief discussion). At least four other goblets of this type decorated with clasped hands and bearing the same poem are recorded, all of which are signed and dated by Sang. These are described by Smit (1992), p. 12, cats. 1759.10 (now in the Museum Boymans-van Beuningen, Rotterdam), 17.59.11 (The Bradford Collection, sold by Christie's, 4 June 1985, lot 58), 1759.12 (sold by Christie's, 15 June 1994, lot 70 and on 26 November 1991, The Peter Lazarus Collection, lot 149) and 1760.1 (The Otto Dettmers Collection, sold by Sotheby's, 23 November 1999, lot 16). A fifth example on a composite stem, but unsigned, is in the Museum De Lekenhal, Leiden, accession no. 2015. All of these examples are inscribed *PROSOPOPIA* (Personification) above the crown. The goblet in the present lot is, however, unique in that it lacks this inscription and is the only example of the type to have survived with a cover.

Though unsigned, from the high quality of the engraving and polished detail, the style and lettering, together with the four known signed examples which closely parallel this glass, the engraving can be attributed to Jacob Sang (active from 1752, died 1785). The form of the glass is also typical of the type used by Sang (see Smit (1992), p.4, fig. A). For glasses of very similar form signed by Sang, but with different engraving, see the example sold by Bonhams, 7 June 2006, lot 49 and another from the A.C.Hubbard Collection, sold 30 November 2011, lot 260. Compare also the example engraved with a comparable inscription from the Mary Ager Collection, sold by Christie's, 18 April 1978, lot 116.

The Davenport glassworks was established adjacent to the firm's pottery at Longport, Staffordshire in 1801. The glass manufactured under the Patent of 1806 was neither etched nor wheel-ground, but was a new technique designed to emulate wheel-engraving. The patented decoration was produced by painting a special mixture incorporating ground glass, sugar and ink onto the glass and scratching the design onto this with tools prior to firing. 

1. OUR ROLE

Examining the wines

It is occasionally possible to provide a pre-*Sale* tasting for larger parcels (as defined below). This is generally limited to more recent and everyday drinking wines. Please contact the department for details.

It is not our policy to inspect every unopened case. In the case of wines older than 20 years the boxes will usually have been opened and levels and appearance noted in the *Catalogue* where necessary. You should make proper allowance for variations in ullage levels and conditions of corks, capsules and labels.

Corks and Ullages

Ullage refers to the space between the base of the cork and the wine. Ullage levels for Bordeaux shaped bottles are only normally noted when below the neck and for Burgundy, Alsace, German and Cognac shaped bottles when greater than 4 centimetres (cm). Acceptable ullage levels increase with age; generally acceptable levels are as follows:

Under 15 years old – into neck or less than 4cm 15 to 30 years old – top shoulder (ts) or up to 5cm Over 30 years old – high shoulder (hs) or up to 6cm

It should be noted that ullages may change between publication of the *Catalogue* and the *Sale* and that corks may fail as a result of transporting the wine. We will only accept responsibility for *Descriptions* of condition at the time of publication of the *Catalogue* and cannot accept responsibility for any loss resulting from failure of corks either before or after this point.

Options to buy parcels

A parcel is a number of *Lots* of identical size of the same wine, bottle size and *Description*. Under this contract the *Seller's* liability in respect of the quality of the *Lot*, it's fitness for any purpose and its conformity with any *Description* is limited. You are strongly advised to examine the *Lot* for yourself and/or obtain an independent examination of it before you buy it.

1 THE CONTRACT

- 1.1 These terms govern the *Contract for Sale* of the *Lot* by the *Seller* to the *Buyer*.
- 1.2 The Definitions and Glossary contained in Appendix 3 in the *Catalogue* are incorporated into this *Contract* for Sale and a separate copy can also be provided by *Bonhams* on request. Where words and phrases are used which are in the List of Definitions, they are printed in italics.
- 1.3 The Seller sells the Lot as the principal to the Contract for Sale, such contract being made between the Seller and you through Bonhams which acts in the sole capacity as the Seller's agent and not as an additional principal. 2 SELLER'S UNDERTAKINGS

Unless agreed in writing with you by Bonhams on the Seller's behalf (in which case you must comply with the terms of that agreement), all such sums must be paid to Bonhams by you in the currency in which the Sale was conducted by not later than 4.30pm on the second working day following the Sale and you must ensure that the funds are cleared by the seventh working day after the Sale. Payment must be made to Bonhams by one of the methods stated in the Notice to Bidders unless otherwise agreed with you in writing by Bonhams. If you do not pay any sums due in accordance with this paragraph, the Seller will have the rights set out in paragraph 8 below.

COLLECTION OF THE LOT

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7.5

- 7.1 Unless otherwise agreed in writing with you by Bonhams, the Lot will be released to you or to your order only when Bonhams has received cleared funds to the amount of the full Purchase Price and all other sums owed by you to the Seller and to Bonhams.
- 7.2 The Seller is entitled to withhold possession from you of any other Lot he has sold to you at the same or at any other Sale and whether currently in Bonhams' possession or not until payment in full and in cleared funds of the Purchase Price and all other sums due to the Seller and/or Bonhams in respect of the Lot.
- 7.3 You will collect and remove the Lot at your own expense from Bonhams' custody and/ or control or from the Storage Contractor's custody in accordance with Bonhams' instructions or requirements.
- 7.4 You will be wholly responsible for packing, handling and transport of the *Lot* on collection and for complying with all import or export regulations in connection with the *Lot*.
 - You will be wholly responsible for any removal, storage or other charges or *Expenses* incurred by the *Seller* if you do not remove the *Lot* in accordance with this paragraph 7 and will indemnify the *Seller* against all charges, costs, including any legal costs and fees, *Expenses* and losses suffered by the *Seller* by reason of your failure to remove the *Lot* including any charges due under any *Storage Contract*. All such sums due to the *Seller* will be payable on demand.

8 FAILURE TO PAY FOR THE LOT

- 8.1 If the Purchase Price for a Lot is not paid to Bonhams in full in accordance with the Contract for Sale the Saller will be entitled, with the prior written agreement of Bonhams but without further notice to you, to exercise one or more of the following rights (whether through Bonhams or otherwise):
- 8.1.1 to terminate immediately the *Contract for Sale* of the *Lot* for your breach of contract;
- 8.1.2 to resell the *Lot* by auction, private treaty or any other means on giving seven days' written notice to you of the intention to resell;
- 8.1.3 to retain possession of the Lot;
- 8.1.4 to remove and store the Lot at your expense;
- 8.1.5 to take legal proceedings against you for any sum due under the *Contract for Sale* and/or damages for breach of contract;
- 8.1.6 to be paid interest on any monies due (after as well as before judgement or order) at the annual rate of 5% per annum above the base rate of National Westminster Bank Plc from time to time to be calculated on a daily basis from the date upon which such monies become payable until the date of actual payment;
- 8.1.7 to repossess the Lot (or any part thereof) which has not become your property, and for this purpose (unless the Buyer buys the Lot as a Consumer from the Seller selling in the course of a Business) you hereby grant an irrevocable licence to the Seller by himself and to his servants or agents to enter upon all or any of your premises (with or without vehicles) during normal Business hours to take possession of the Lot or part thereof;
- 8.1.8 to retain possession of any other property sold to you by the Seller at the Sale or any other auction or by private treaty until all sums due under the Contract for Sale shall have been paid in full in cleared funds;
- 8.1.9 to retain possession of, and on three months' written notice to sell, Without Reserve, any of your other property in the possession of the Seller and/or of Bonhams (as bailee for the Seller) for any purpose (including, without limitation, other goods sold to you) and to apply any monies due to you as a result of such Sale in satisfaction or part satisfaction of any amounts owed to the Seller or to Bonhams; and
- 8.1.10 so long as such goods remain in the possession of the Seller or Bonhams as its bailee, to rescind the contract for the Sale of any other goods sold to you by the Seller at the Sale or at any other auction or by private treaty and apply any monies received from you in respect of such goods in part or full satisfaction of any amounts owed to the Seller or to Bonhams by you.
- 8.2 You agree to indemnify the Seller against all legal and other costs of enforcement, all losses and other Expenses and costs (including any monies payable to Bonhams in order to obtain the release of the Lot) incurred by the Seller (whether or not court proceedings will have been issued) as a result of Bonhams taking steps under this paragraph 8 on a full indemnity basis together with interest thereon (after as well as before judgement or order) at the rate specified in paragraph 8.1.6 from the date upon which the Seller becomes liable to pay the same until payment by you.
- 8.3 On any resale of the Lot under paragraph 8.1.2, the Seller will account to you in respect of any balance remaining from any monies received by him or on his behalf in respect of the Lot, after the payment of all sums due to the Seller and to Bonhams, within 28 days of receipt of such monies by him or on his behalf.

THE SELLER'S LIABILITY

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- 9.1 The Seller will not be liable for any injury, loss or damage caused by the Lot after the fall of the Auctioneer's hammer in respect of the Lot.
- 9.2 Subject to paragraph 9.3 below, except for breach of the express undertaking provided in paragraph 2.1.5, the *Seller* will not be liable for any breach of any term that the *Lot* will correspond with any *Description* applied to it by or on behalf of the *Seller*, whether implied by the Sale of Goods Act 1979 or otherwise.
- 9.3 Unless the *Seller* sells the *Lot* in the course of a *Business* and the *Buyer* buys it as a *Consumer*,
- 9.3.1 the Seller will not be liable (whether in negligence, other tort, breach of contract or statutory duty or in restitution or under the Misrepresentation Act 1967, or in any other way) for any lack of conformity with, or inaccuracy, error, misdescription or omission in any Description of the Lot or any Entry or Estimate in relation to the Lot made by or on behalf of the Seller (whether made in writing, including in the Catalogue, or on the Website, or orally, or by conduct or otherwise) and whether made before or after this agreement or prior to or during the Sale;
- 9.3.2 the Seller will not be liable for any loss of Business, Business profits or revenue or income or for loss of reputation or for disruption to Business or wasted time on the part of the Buyer or of the Buyer's management or staff or, for any indirect losses or consequential damages of any kind, irrespective in any case of the nature, volume or source of the loss or damage alleged to be suffered, and irrespective of whether the said loss or damage is caused by or claimed in respect of any negligence, other tort, breach of contract, statutory duty, restitutionary claim or otherwise;
- 9.3.3 in any circumstances where the Seller is liable to you in respect of the Lot, or any act, omission, statement, or representation in respect of it, or this agreement or its performance, and whether in damages, for an indemnity or contribution or for a restitutionary remedy or in any way whatsoever, the Seller's liability will be limited to payment of a sum which will not exceed by way of maximum the amount of the Purchase Price of the Lot irrespective in any case of the nature, volume or source of any loss or damage alleged to be suffered or sum claimed as due, and irrespective of whether the liability arises from any negligence, other tort, breach of contract, statutory duty, bailee's duty, restitutionary claim or otherwise.
- 9.4 Nothing set out in paragraphs 9.1 to 9.3 above will be construed as excluding or restricting (whether directly or indirectly) any person's liability or excluding or restricting any person's rights or remedies in respect of (i) fraud, or (ii) death or personal injury caused by the *Seller's* negligence (or any person under the *Seller's* control or for whom the *Seller* is legally responsible), or (iii) acts or omissions for which the *Seller* is liability to the extent the same may not be excluded or restricted as a matter of law.

10 MISCELLANEOUS

- 10.1 You may not assign either the benefit or burden of the *Contract for Sale.*
- 10.2 The Seller's failure or delay in enforcing or exercising any power or right under the Contract for Sale will not operate or be deemed to operate as a waiver of his rights under it except to the extent of any express waiver given to you in writing. Any such waiver will not affect the Seller's ability subsequently to enforce any right arising under the Contract for Sale.

- 10.3 If either party to the Contract for Sale is prevented from performing that party's respective obligations under the Contract for Sale by circumstances beyond its reasonable control or if performance of its obligations would by reason of such circumstances give rise to a significantly increased financial cost to it, that party will not, for so long as such circumstances prevail, be required to perform such obligations. This paragraph does not apply to the obligations imposed on you by paragraph 6.
- 10.4 Any notice or other communication to be given under the *Contract for Sale* must be in writing and may be delivered by hand or sent by first class post or air mail or fax transmission, if to the *Seller*, addressed *Co Bonhams* at its address or fax number in the *Catalogue* (marked for the attention of the Company Secretary), and if to you to the address or fax number of the *Buyer* given in the *Bidding Form* (unless notice of any change of address is given in writing). It is the responsibility of the sender of the notice or communication to ensure that it is received in a legible form within any applicable time period.
- 10.5 If any term or any part of any term of the Contract for Sale is held to be unenforceable or invalid, such unenforceability or invalidity will not affect the enforceability and validity of the remaining terms or the remainder of the relevant term.
- 10.6 References in the Contract for Sale to Bonhams will, where appropriate, include reference to Bonhams' officers, employees and agents.
- 10.7 The headings used in the Contract for Sale are for convenience only and will not affect its interpretation.
- 10.8 In the *Contract for Sale* "including" means "including, without limitation".
- 10.9 References to the singular will include reference to the plural (and vice versa) and reference to any one gender will include reference to the other genders.
- 10.10 Reference to a numbered paragraph is to a paragraph of the *Contract for Sale*.
- 10.11 Save as expressly provided in paragraph 10.12 nothing in the Contract for Sale confers (or purports to confer) on any person who is not a party to the Contract for Sale any benefit conferred by, or the right to enforce any term of, the Contract for Sale.
- 10.12 Where the Contract for Sale confers an immunity from, and/or an exclusion or restriction of, the responsibility and/or liability of the Seller, it will also operate in favour and for the benefit of Bonhams, Bonhams' holding company and the subsidiaries of such holding company and the subsidiaries of such holding company and the successors and assigns of Bonhams and of such companies and of any officer, employee and agent of Bonhams and such companies, each of whom will be entitled to rely on the relevant immunity and/or exclusion and/or restriction within and for the purposes of Contracts (Rights of Third Parties) Act 1999, which enables the benefit of a contract to be extended to a person who is not a party to the contract, and generally at law.

GOVERNING LAW

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All transactions to which the *Contract for Sale* applies and all connected matters will be governed by and construed in accordance with the laws of that part of the United Kingdom where the *Sale* takes place and the *Seller* and you each submit to the exclusive jurisdiction of the courts of that part of the United Kingdom, save that the *Seller* may bring proceedings against you in any other court of competent jurisdiction to the extent permitted by the laws of the relevant jurisdiction. *Bonhams* has a complaints procedure in place.

APPENDIX 2

BUYER'S AGREEMENT

IMPORTANT: These terms may be changed in advance of the Sale of the Lot to you, by the setting out of different terms in the Catalogue for the Sale and/or by placing an insert in the Catalogue and/or by notices at the Sale venue and/or by oral announcements before and during the Sale at the Sale venue. You should be alert to this possibility of changes and ask in advance of bidding if there have been any.

1 THE CONTRACT

- 1.1 These terms govern the contract between *Bonhams* personally and the *Buyer*, being the person to whom a *Lot* has been knocked down by the *Auctioneer*.
- 1.2 The Definitions and Glossary contained in Appendix 3 to the Catalogue for the Sale are incorporated into this agreement and a separate copy can also be provided by us on request. Where words and phrases which are defined in the List of Definitions are used in this agreement, they are printed in italics. Reference is made in this agreement to information printed in the Notice to Bidders, printed in the Catalogue for the Sale, and where such information is referred to it is incorporated into this agreement.
- 1.3 Except as specified in paragraph 4 of the Notice to Bidders the Contract for Sale of the Lot between you and the Seller is made on the fall of the Auctioneer's hammer in respect of the Lot, when it is knocked down to you. At that moment a separate contract is also made between you and Bonhams on the terms in this Buyer's Agreement.
- 1.4 We act as agents for the *Seller* and are not answerable or personally responsible to you for any breach of contract or other default by the *Seller*, unless *Bonhams* sells the *Lot* as principal.
- 1.5 Our personal obligations to you are governed by this agreement and we agree, subject to the terms below, to the following obligations:
- 1.5.1 we will, until the date and time specified in the *Notice to Bidders* or otherwise notified to you, store the *Lot* in accordance with paragraph 5;
- 1.5.2 subject to any power of the Seller or us to refuse to release the Lot to you, we will release the Lot to you in accordance with paragraph 4 once you have paid to us, in cleared funds, everything due to us and the Seller;
- 1.5.3 we will provide guarantees in the terms set out in paragraphs 9 and 10.
- 1.6 We do not make or give and do not agree to make or give any contractual promise, undertaking, obligation, Guarantee, warranty, representation of fact in relation to any Description of the Lot or any Estimate in relation to it, nor of the accuracy or completeness of any Description or Estimate which may have been made by us or on our behalf or by or on behalf of the Seller (whether made orally or in writing, including in the Catalogue or on Bonhams' Website, or by conduct, or otherwise), and whether made before or after this agreement or prior to or during the Sale. No such Description or Estimate is incorporated into this agreement between you and us. Any such Description or Estimate, if made by us or on our behalf, was (unless Bonhams itself sells the Lot as principal) made as agent on behalf of the Seller

2 PERFORMANCE OF THE CONTRACT FOR SALE

You undertake to us personally that you will observe and comply with all your obligations and undertakings to the *Seller* under the *Contract for Sale* in respect of the *Lot*.

3 PAYMENT

- 3.1 Unless agreed in writing between you and us or as otherwise set out in the *Notice to Bidders*, you must pay to us by not later than 4.30pm on the second working day following the *Sale*:
- 3.1.1 the Purchase Price for the Lot;
- 3.1.2 a *Buyer's Premium* in accordance with the rates set out in the *Notice to Bidders*, and
- 3.1.3 if the Lot is marked [^{AR}], an Additional Premium which is calculated and payable in accordance with the Notice to Bidders together with VAT on that sum if applicable so that all sums due to us are cleared funds by the seventh working day after the Sale.
- 3.2 You must also pay us on demand any *Expenses* payable pursuant to this agreement.
- 3.3 All payments to us must be made in the currency in which the Sale was conducted, using, unless otherwise agreed by us in writing, one of the methods of payment set out in the Notice to Bidders. Our invoices will only be addressed to the registered Bidder unless the Bidder is acting as an agent for a named principal and we have approved that arrangement, in which case we will address the invoice to the principal.
- 3.4 Unless otherwise stated in this agreement all sums payable to us will be subject to VAT at the appropriate rate and VAT will be payable by you on all such sums.
- 3.5 We may deduct and retain for our own benefit from the monies paid by you to us the Buyer's Premium, the Commission payable by the Seller in respect of the Lot, any Expenses and VAT and any interest earned and/or incurred until payment to the Seller.
- 3.6 Time will be of the essence in relation to any payment payable to us. If you do not pay the *Purchase Price*, or any other sum due to us in accordance with this paragraph 3, we will have the rights set out in paragraph 7 below.
- 3.7 Where a number of Lots have been knocked down to you, any monies we receive from you will be applied firstly pro-rata to pay the Purchase Price of each Lot and secondly pro-rata to pay all amounts due to Bonhams.

4 COLLECTION OF THE LOT

- 4.1 Subject to any power of the Seller or us to refuse to release the Lot to you, once you have paid to us, in cleared funds, everything due to the Seller and to us, we will release the Lot to you or as you may direct us in writing. The Lot will only be released on production of a buyer collection document, obtained from our cashier's office.
- 4.2 You must collect and remove the Lot at your own expense by the date and time specified in the Notice to Bidders, or if no date is specified, by 4.30pm on the seventh day after the Sale.
- 4.3 For the period referred to in paragraph 4.2, the Lot can be collected from the address referred to in the Notice to Bidders for collection on the days and times specified in the Notice to Bidders. Thereafter, the Lot may be removed elsewhere for storage and you must enquire from us as to when and where you can collect it, although this information will usually be set out in the Notice to Bidders.

If you have not collected the *Lot* by the date specified in the *Notice* to *Bidders*, you authorise us, acting as your agent and on your behalf, to enter into a contract (the "*Storage Contract*") with the *Storage Contractor* for the storage of the *Lot* on the then current standard terms and conditions agreed between *Bonhams* and the *Storage Contractor* (copies of which are available on request). If the *Lot* is stored at our premises storage fees at our current daily rates (currently a minimum of £3 plus *VAT* per *Lot* per day) will be payable from the expiry of the period referred to in paragraph 4.2. These storage fees form part of our *Expenses*.

4.4

- 4.5 Until you have paid the Purchase Price and any Expenses in full the Lot will either be held by us as agent on behalf of the Seller or held by the Storage Contractor as agent on behalf of the Seller and ourselves on the terms contained in the Storage Contract.
- 4.6 You undertake to comply with the terms of any Storage Contract and in particular to pay the charges (and all costs of moving the Lot into storage) due under any Storage Contract. You acknowledge and agree that you will not be able to collect the Lot from the Storage Contractor's premises until you have paid the Purchase Price, any Expenses and all charges due under the Storage Contract.
- 4.7 You will be wholly responsible for packing, handling and transport of the *Lot* on collection and for complying with all import or export regulations in connection with the *Lot*.
- 4.8 You will be wholly responsible for any removal, storage, or other charges for any *Lot* not removed in accordance with paragraph 4.2, payable at our current rates, and any *Expenses* we incur (including any charges due under the *Storage Contract*), all of which must be paid by you on demand and in any event before any collection of the *Lot* by you or on your behalf.

5 STORING THE LOT

We agree to store the Lot until the earlier of your removal of the Lot or until the time and date set out in the Notice to Bidders, on the Sale Information Page or at the back of the catalogue (or if no date is specified, by 4.30pm on the seventh day after the Sale) and, subject to paragraphs 6 and 10, to be responsible as bailee to you for damage to or the loss or destruction of the Lot (notwithstanding that it is not your property before payment of the Purchase Price). If you do not collect the Lot before the time and date set out in the Notice to Bidders (or if no date is specified, by 4.30pm on the seventh day after the Sale) we may remove the Lot to another location, the details of which will usually be set out in the relevant section of the Catalogue. If you have not paid for the Lot in accordance with paragraph 3, and the Lot is moved to any third party's premises, the Lot will be held by such third party strictly to Bonhams' order and we will retain our lien over the Lot until we have been paid in full in accordance with paragraph 3.

RESPONSIBILITY FOR THE LOT

6

- Only on the payment of the *Purchase Price* to us will title in the *Lot* pass to you. However under the *Contract for Sale*, the risk in the *Lot* passed to you when it was knocked down to you.
- You are advised to obtain insurance in respect of the *Lot* as soon as possible after the *Sale*.

7 FAILURE TO PAY OR TO REMOVE THE LOT AND PART PAYMENTS

- 7.1 If all sums payable to us are not so paid in full at the time they are due and/or the *Lot* is not removed in accordance with this agreement, we will without further notice to you be entitled to exercise one or more of the following rights (without prejudice to any rights we may exercise on behalf of the *Seller*):
- 7.1.1 to terminate this agreement immediately for your breach of contract;
- 7.1.2 to retain possession of the Lot;
- 7.1.3 to remove, and/or store the Lot at your expense;
- 7.1.4 to take legal proceedings against you for payment of any sums payable to us by you (including the *Purchase Price*) and/or damages for breach of contract;
- 7.1.5 to be paid interest on any monies due to us (after as well as before judgement or order) at the annual rate of 5% per annum above the base lending rate of National Westminster Bank Plc from time to time to be calculated on a daily basis from the date upon which such monies become payable until the date of actual payment;
- 7.1.6 to repossess the Lot (or any part thereof) which has not become your property, and for this purpose (unless you buy the Lot as a Consumer) you hereby grant an irrevocable licence to us, by ourselves, our servants or agents, to enter upon all or any of your premises (with or without vehicles) during normal business hours to take possession of any Lot or part thereof;
- 7.1.7 to sell the Lot Without Reserve by auction, private treaty or any other means on giving you three months' written notice of our intention to do so;
- 7.1.8 to retain possession of any of your other property in our possession for any purpose (including, without limitation, other goods sold to you or with us for Sale) until all sums due to us have been paid in full;
- 7.1.9 to apply any monies received from you for any purpose whether at the time of your default or at any time thereafter in payment or part payment of any sums due to us by you under this agreement;
- 7.1.10 on three months' written notice to sell, Without Reserve, any of your other property in our possession or under our control for any purpose (including other goods sold to you or with us for Sale) and to apply any monies due to you as a result of such Sale in payment or part payment of any amounts owed to us;
- 7.1.11 refuse to allow you to register for a future Sale or to reject a bid from you at any future Sale or to require you to pay a deposit before any bid is accepted by us at any future Sale in which case we will be entitled to apply such deposit in payment or part payment, as the case may be, of the Purchase Price of any Lot of which you are the Buyer.
- 7.2 You agree to indemnify us against all legal and other costs, all losses and all other *Expenses* (whether or not court proceedings will have been issued) incurred by us as a result of our taking steps under this paragraph 7 on a full indemnity basis together with interest thereon (after as well as before judgement or order) at the rate specified in paragraph 7.1.5 from the date upon which we become liable to pay the same until payment by you.

- 7.3 If you pay us only part of the sums due to us such payment shall be applied firstly to the *Purchase Price* of the *Lot* (or where you have purchased more than one *Lot* pro-rata towards the *Purchase Price* of each *Lot*) and secondly to the *Buyer's Premium* (or where you have purchased more than one *Lot* pro-rata to the *Buyer's Premium* on each *Lot*) and thirdly to any other sums due to us.
- 7.4 We will account to you in respect of any balance we hold remaining from any monies received by us in respect of any Sale of the Lot under our rights under this paragraph 7 after the payment of all sums due to us and/or the Seller within 28 days of receipt by us of all such sums paid to us.

8 CLAIMS BY OTHER PERSONS IN RESPECT OF THE LOT

- 8.1 Whenever it becomes apparent to us that the Lot is the subject of a claim by someone other than you and other than the Seller (or that such a claim can reasonably be expected to be made), we may, at our absolute discretion, deal with the Lot in any manner which appears to us to recognise the legitimate interests of ourselves and the other parties involved and lawfully to protect our position and our legitimate interests. Without prejudice to the generality of the discretion and by way of example, we may:
- 8.1.1 retain the *Lot* to investigate any question raised or reasonably expected by us to be raised in relation to the *Lot*; and/or
- 8.1.2 deliver the Lot to a person other than you; and/or
- 8.1.3 commence interpleader proceedings or seek any other order of any court, mediator, arbitrator or government body; and/or
- 8.1.4 require an indemnity and/or security from you in return for pursuing a course of action agreed to by you.
- 8.2 The discretion referred to in paragraph 8.1:
- 8.2.1 may be exercised at any time during which we have actual or constructive possession of the *Lot*, or at any time after such possession, where the cessation of such possession has occurred by reason of any decision, order or ruling of any court, mediator, arbitrator or government body; and
- 8.2.2 will not be exercised unless we believe that there exists a serious prospect of a good arguable case in favour of the claim.

9 FORGERIES

- 9.1 We undertake a personal responsibility for any *Forgery* in accordance with the terms of this paragraph 9.
- 9.2 Paragraph 9 applies only if:
- 9.2.1 your name appears as the named person to whom the original invoice was made out by us in respect of the *Lot* and that invoice has been paid; and
- 9.2.2 you notify us in writing as soon as reasonably practicable after you have become aware that the *Lot* is or may be a *Forgery*, and in any event within one year after the *Sale*, that the *Lot* is a *Forgery*; and
- 9.2.3 within one month after such notification has been given, you return the *Lot* to us in the same condition as it was at the time of the *Sale*, accompanied by written evidence that the *Lot* is a *Forgery* and details of the *Sale* and *Lot* number sufficient to identify the *Lot*.

9.3 Paragraph 9 will not apply in respect of a Forgery if:

- 9.3.1 the Entry in relation to the Lot contained in the Catalogue reflected the then accepted general opinion of scholars and experts or fairly indicated that there was a conflict of such opinion or reflected the then current opinion of an expert acknowledged to be a leading expert in the relevant field; or
- 9.3.2 it can be established that the *Lot* is a *Forgery* only by means of a process not generally accepted for use until after the date on which the *Catalogue* was published or by means of a process which it was unreasonable in all the circumstances for us to have employed.
- 9.4 You authorise us to carry out such processes and tests on the *Lot* as we in our absolute discretion consider necessary to satisfy ourselves that the *Lot* is or is not a *Forgery*.
- 9.5 If we are satisfied that a Lot is a Forgery we will (as principal) purchase the Lot from you and you will transfer the title to the Lot in question to us, with full title guarantee, free from any liens, charges, encumbrances and adverse claims, in accordance with the provisions of Sections 12(1) and 12(2) of the Sale of Goods Act 1979 and we will pay to you an amount equal to the sum of the Purchase Price, Buyer's Premium, VAT and Expenses paid by you in respect of the Lot.
- 9.6 The benefit of paragraph 9 is personal to, and incapable of assignment by, you.
- 9.7 If you sell or otherwise dispose of your interest in the Lot, all rights and benefits under this paragraph will cease.
- 9.8 Paragraph 9 does not apply to a Lot made up of or including a Chinese painting or Chinese paintings, a motor vehicle or motor vehicles, a Stamp or Stamps or a Book or Books.

10 OUR LIABILITY

- 10.1 We will not be liable whether in negligence, other tort, breach of contract or statutory duty or in restitution or under the Misrepresentation Act 1967 or in any other way for lack of conformity with or any inaccuracy, error, misdescription or omission in any *Description* of the *Lot* or any *Entry* or *Estimate* in respect of it, made by us or on our behalf or by or on behalf of the *Seller* (whether made in writing, including in the *Catalogue*, or on the *Bonhams' Website*, or orally, or by conduct or otherwise) and whether made before or after this agreement or prior to or during the *Sale*.
- 10.2 Our duty to you while the Lot is at your risk and/or your property and in our custody and/or control is to exercise reasonable care in relation to it, but we will not be responsible for damage to the Lot or to other persons or things caused by:

- 10.3.1 We will not be liable to you for any loss of Business, Business profits, revenue or income or for loss of Business reputation or for disruption to Business or wasted time on the part of the Buyer's management or staff or, if you are buying the Lot in the course of a Business, for any indirect losses or consequential damages of any kind, irrespective in any case of the nature, volume or source of the loss or damage alleged to be suffered, and irrespective of whether the said loss or damage is caused by or claimed in respect of any negligence, other tort, breach of contract, statutory duty, bailee's duty, a restitutionary claim or otherwise.

10.4 Nothing set out above will be construed as excluding or restricting (whether directly or indirectly) any person's liability or excluding or restricting any person's rights or remedies in respect of (i) fraud, or (ii) death or personal injury caused by our negligence (or any person under our control or for whom we are legally responsible), or (iii) acts or omissions for which we are liable under the Occupiers Liability Act 1957, or (iv) any other liability to the extent the same may not be excluded or restricted as a matter of law, or (v) under our undertaking in paragraph 9 of these conditions.

11 BOOKS MISSING TEXT OR ILLUSTRATIONS

Where the Lot is made up wholly of a Book or Books and any Book does not contain text or illustrations (in either case referred to as a "non-conforming Lot"), we undertake a personal responsibility for such a non-conforming Lot in accordance with the terms of this paragraph, if:

the original invoice was made out by us to you in respect of the *Lot* and that invoice has been paid; and

you notify us in writing as soon as reasonably practicable after you have become aware that the *Lot* is or may be a non-conforming *Lot*, and in any event within 20 days after the *Sale* (or such longer period as we may agree in writing) that the *Lot* is a non-conforming *Lot*; and

within 20 days of the date of the relevant *Sale* (or such longer period as we may agree in writing) you return the *Lot* to us in the same condition as it was at the time of the *Sale*, accompanied by written evidence that the *Lot* is a non-conforming *Lot* and details of the *Sale* and *Lot* number sufficient to identify the *Lot*.

but not if:

the *Entry* in the *Catalogue* in respect of the *Lot* indicates that the rights given by this paragraph do not apply to it; or

the *Entry* in the *Catalogue* in respect of the *Lot* reflected the then accepted general opinion of scholars and experts or fairly indicated that there was a conflict of such opinion; or

it can be established that the *Lot* is a non-conforming *Lot* only by means of a process not generally accepted for use until after the date on which the *Catalogue* was published or by means of a process which it was unreasonable in all the circumstances for us to have employed; or

the *Lot* comprises atlases, maps, autographs, manuscripts, extra illustrated books, music or periodical publications; or

the Lot was listed in the Catalogue under "collections" or "collections and various" or the Lot was stated in the Catalogue to comprise or contain a collection, issue or Books which are undescribed or the missing text or illustrations are referred to or the relevant parts of the Book contain blanks, half titles or advertisements.

If we are reasonably satisfied that a Lot is a nonconforming Lot, we will (as principal) purchase the Lot from you and you will transfer the title to the Lot in question to us, with full title guarantee, free from any liens, charges, encumbrances and adverse claims and we will pay to you an amount equal to the sum of the Purchase Price and Buyer's Premium paid by you in respect of the Lot.

The benefit of paragraph 10 is personal to, and incapable of assignment by, you and if you sell or otherwise dispose of your interest in the *Lot*, all rights and benefits under this paragraph will cease.

12 MISCELLANEOUS

- 12.1 You may not assign either the benefit or burden of this agreement.
- 12.2 Our failure or delay in enforcing or exercising any power or right under this agreement will not operate or be deemed to operate as a waiver of our rights under it except to the extent of any express waiver given to you in writing. Any such waiver will not affect our ability subsequently to enforce any right arising under this agreement.
- 12.3 If either party to this agreement is prevented from performing that party's respective obligations under this agreement by circumstances beyond its reasonable control or if performance of its obligations would by reason of such circumstances give rise to a significantly increased financial cost to it, that party will not, for so long as such circumstances prevail, be required to perform such obligations. This paragraph does not apply to the obligations imposed on you by paragraph 3.
- 12.4 Any notice or other communication to be given under this agreement must be in writing and may be delivered by hand or sent by first class post or air mail or fax transmission (if to Bonhams marked for the attention of the Company Secretary), to the address or fax number of the relevant party given in the Contract Form (unless notice of any change of address is given in writing). It is the responsibility of the sender of the notice or communication to ensure that it is received in a legible form within any applicable time period.
- 12.5 If any term or any part of any term of this agreement is held to be unenforceable or invalid, such unenforceability or invalidity will not affect the enforceability and validity of the remaining terms or the remainder of the relevant term.
- 12.6 References in this agreement to *Bonhams* will, where appropriate, include reference to *Bonhams*' officers, employees and agents.

- 12.7 The headings used in this agreement are for convenience only and will not affect its interpretation.
- 12.8 In this agreement "including" means "including, without limitation".
- 12.9 References to the singular will include reference to the plural (and vice versa) and reference to any one gender will include reference to the other genders.
- 12.10 Reference to a numbered paragraph is to a paragraph of this agreement.
- 12.11 Save as expressly provided in paragraph 12.12 nothing in this agreement confers (or purports to confer) on any person who is not a party to this agreement any benefit conferred by, or the right to enforce any term of, this agreement.
- 12.12 Where this agreement confers an immunity from, and/or an exclusion or restriction of, the responsibility and/or liability of *Bonhams*, it will also operate in favour and for the benefit of *Bonhams*' holding company and the subsidiaries of such holding company and the successors and assigns of *Bonhams* and of such companies, and of such companies, and of such companies, each of whom will be entitled to rely on the relevant immunity and/or exclusion and/or restriction within and for the purposes of Contracts (Rights of Third Parties) Act 1999, which enables the benefit of a contract to be extended to a person who is not a party to the contract, and generally at law.

13 GOVERNING LAW

All transactions to which this agreement applies and all connected matters will be governed by and construed in accordance with the laws of that part of the United Kingdom where the Sale takes (or is to take) place and we and you each submit to the exclusive jurisdiction of the courts of that part of the United Kingdom, save that we may bring proceedings against you in any other court of competent jurisdiction to the extent permitted by the laws of the relevant jurisdiction. Bonhams has a complaints procedure in place.

Where we obtain any personal information about you, we shall only use it in accordance with the terms of our Privacy Policy (subject to any additional specific consent(s) you may have given at the time your information was disclosed). DEFINITIONS AND GLOSSARY

Where these Definitions and Glossary are incorporated, the following words and phrases used have (unless the context otherwise requires) the meanings given to them below. The Glossary is to assist you to understand words and phrases which have a specific legal meaning with which you may not be familiar.

LIST OF DEFINITIONS

"Additional Premium" a premium, calculated in accordance with the Notice to Bidders, to cover Bonhams' Expenses relating to the payment of royalties under the Artists Resale Right Regulations 2006 which is payable by the Buyer to Bonhams on any Lot marked [AR] which sells for a Hammer Price which together with the Buyer's Premium (but excluding any VAT) equals or exceeds 1000 euros (converted into the currency of the Sale using the European Central Bank Reference rate prevailing on the date of the Sale). "Auctioneer" the representative of Bonhams conducting the Sale. "Bidder" a person who has completed a *Bidding Form.* "Bidding Form" our Bidding Registration Form, our Absentee Bidding Form or our Telephone Bidding Form.

"Bonhams" Bonhams 1793 Limited or its successors or assigns. Bonhams is also referred to in the Buyer's Agreement, the Conditions of Business and the Notice to Bidders by the words "we", "us" and "our".

"Book" a printed Book offered for Sale at a specialist Book Sale.

"Business" includes any trade, Business and profession. "Buyer" the person to whom a Lot is knocked down by the Auctioneer. The Buyer is also referred to in the Contract for Sale and the Buyer's Agreement by the words "you" and "your".

"Buyer's Agreement" the contract entered into by Bonhams with the Buyer (see Appendix 2 in the Catalogue). "Buyer's Premium" the sum calculated on the Hammer Price

at the rates stated in the Notice to Bidders. "Catalogue" the Catalogue relating to the relevant Sale,

including any representation of the Catalogue published on our Website.

"Commission" the Commission payable by the Seller to Bonhams calculated at the rates stated in the Contract Form. "Condition Report" a report on the physical condition of a Lot provided to a Bidder or potential Bidder by Bonhams on behalf of the Seller.

"Conditions of Sale" the Notice to Bidders, Contract for Sale, Buyer's Agreement and Definitions and Glossary.

"Consignment Fee" a fee payable to *Bonhams* by the *Seller* calculated at rates set out in the Conditions of Business. "Consumer" a natural person who is acting for the relevant

purpose outside his trade, *Business* or profession. "Contract Form" the *Contract Form*, or vehicle *Entry* form, as

applicable, signed by or on behalf of the *Seller* listing the *Lots* to be offered for *Sale* by *Bonhams*.

"Contract for Sale" the Sale contract entered into by the Seller with the Buyer (see Appendix 1 in the Catalogue). "Contractual Description" the only Description of the Lot

(being that part of the *Entry* about the *Lot* in the *Catalogue* which is in bold letters, any photograph (except for the colour) and the contents of any *Condition Report*) to which the *Seller* undertakes in the *Contract of Sale* the *Lot* corresponds. "Description" any statement or representation in any

way descriptive of the *Lot*, including any statement or representation relating to its authorship, attribution, condition, provenance, authenticity, style, period, age, suitability, quality, origin, value, estimated selling price (including the *Hammer Price*).

"Entry" a written statement in the *Catalogue* identifying the *Lot* and its *Lot* number which may contain a *Description* and illustration(s) relating to the *Lot*.

"Estimate" a statement of our opinion of the range within which the hammer is likely to fall.

"Expenses" charges and Expenses paid or payable by Bonhams in respect of the Lot including legal Expenses, banking charges and Expenses incurred as a result of an electronic transfer of money, charges and Expenses for loss and damage cover, insurance, Catalogue and other reproductions and illustrations, any customs duties, advertising, packing or shipping costs, reproductions rights' fees, taxes, levies, costs of testing, searches or enquiries, preparation of the Lot for Sale, storage charges, removal charges, removal charges or costs of collection from the Seller as the Seller's agents or from a defaulting Buyer, plus VAT if applicable.

"Forgery" an imitation intended by the maker or any other person to deceive as to authorship, attribution, origin, authenticity, style, date, age, period, provenance, culture, source or composition, which at the date of the Sale had a value materially less than it would have had if the Lot had not been such an imitation, and which is not stated to be such an imitation in any description of the Lot. A Lot will not be a Forgery by reason of any damage to, and/or restoration and/ or modification work (including repainting or over painting) having been carried out on the Lot, where that damage, restoration or modification work (as the case may be) does not substantially affect the identity of the Lot as one conforming to the Description of the Lot.

"Guarantee" the obligation undertaken personally by Bonhams to the Buyer in respect of any Forgery and, in the case of specialist Stamp Sales and/or specialist Book Sales, a Lot made up of a Stamp or Stamps or a Book or Books as set out in the Buyer's Agreement.

"Hammer Price" the price in the currency in which the Sale is conducted at which a Lot is knocked down by the Auctioneer.

"Loss and Damage Warranty" means the warranty described in paragraph 8.2 of the Conditions of Business.

"Loss and Damage Warranty Fee" means the fee described in paragraph 8.2.3 of the Conditions of Business.

"Lot" any item consigned to Bonhams with a view to its Sale at auction or by private treaty (and reference to any Lot will include, unless the context otherwise requires, reference to individual items comprised in a group of two or more items offered for Sale as one Lot).

"Motoring Catalogue Fee" a fee payable by the Seller to Bonhams in consideration of the additional work undertaken by Bonhams in respect of the cataloguing of motor vehicles and in respect of the promotion of Sales of motor vehicles. "New Bond Street" means Bonhams' saleroom at 101 New Bond Street, London W1S 1SR.

"Notional Charges" the amount of Commission and VAT which would have been payable if the Lot had been sold at the Notional Price.

"Notional Fee" the sum on which the Consignment Fee payable to Bonhams by the Seller is based and which is calculated according to the formula set out in the Conditions of Business.

"Notional Price" the latest in time of the average of the high and low *Estimates* given by us to you or stated in the *Catalogue* or, if no such *Estimates* have been given or stated, the *Reserve* applicable to the *Lot*.

"Notice to Bidders" the notice printed at the back or front of our Catalogues.

"Purchase Price" the aggregate of the Hammer Price and VAT on the Hammer Price (where applicable), the Buyer's Premium and VAT on the Buyer's Premium and any Expenses.

"Reserve" the minimum price at which a *Lot* may be sold (whether at auction or by private treaty).

"Sale" the auction Sale at which a Lot is to be offered for Sale by Bonhams.

"Sale Proceeds" the net amount due to the Seller from the Sale of a Lot, being the Hammer Price less the Commission, any VAT chargeable thereon, Expenses and any other amount due to us in whatever capacity and howsoever arising.

"Seller" the person who offers the Lot for Sale named on the Contract Form. Where the person so named identifies on the form another person as acting as his agent, or where the person named on the Contract Form acts as an agent for a principal (whether such agency is disclosed to Bonhams or not), "Seller" includes both the agent and the principal who shall be jointly and severally liable as such. "Standard Examination" a visual examination of a *Lot* by a non-specialist member of *Bonhams*' staff.

"Storage Contractor" means the company identified as such in the Catalogue.

"Terrorism" means any act or threatened act of terrorism, whether any person is acting alone or on behalf of or in connection with any organisation(s) and/or government(s), committed for political, religious or ideological or similar purposes including, but not limited to, the intention to influence any government and/or put the public or any section of the public into fear.

"Trust Account" the bank account of *Bonhams* into which all sums received in respect of the *Purchase Price* of any *Lot* will be paid, such account to be a distinct and separate account to *Bonhams*' normal business bank account. "VAT" value added tax at the prevailing rate at the date of the *Sale* in the United Kingdom.

"Website" Bonhams Website at www.bonhams.com "Withdrawal Notice" the Seller's written notice to Bonhams revoking Bonhams' instructions to sell a Lot.

"Without Reserve" where there is no minimum price at which a Lot may be sold (whether at auction or by private treaty).

GLOSSARY

The following expressions have specific legal meanings with which you may not be familiar. The following glossary is intended to give you an understanding of those expressions but is not intended to limit their legal meanings: "artist's resale right": the right of the creator of a work of art to receive a payment on *Sales* of that work subsequent to the original *Sale* of that work by the creator of it as set out in the Artists Resale Right Regulations 2006.

"bailee": a person to whom goods are entrusted. "indemnity": an obligation to put the person who has the benefit of the indemnity in the same position in which he would have been, had the circumstances giving rise to the indemnity not arisen and the expression "indemnify" is construed accordingly.

"interpleader proceedings": proceedings in the Courts to determine ownership or rights over a *Lot*.

"knocked down": when a Lot is sold to a Bidder, indicated by the fall of the hammer at the Sale.

"lien": a right for the person who has possession of the *Lot* to retain possession of it.

"risk": the possibility that a Lot may be lost, damaged,

destroyed, stolen, or deteriorate in condition or value. "title": the legal and equitable right to the ownership of a *Lot.* "tort": a legal wrong done to someone to whom the wrong doer has a duty of care.

SALE OF GOODS ACT 1979

The following is an extract from the Sale of Goods Act 1979:

"Section 12 Implied terms about title, etc

(1) In a contract of sale, other than one to which subsection (3) below applies, there is an implied term on the part of the seller that in the case of a sale he has a right to sell the goods, and in the case of an agreement to sell he will have such a right at the time when the property is to pass.

In a contract of sale, other than one to which subsection
 (3) below applies, there is also an implied term that-

- (a) the goods are free, and will remain free until the time when the property is to pass, from any charge or encumbrance not disclosed or known to the buyer before the contract is made, and
- (b) the buyer will enjoy quiet possession of the goods except in so far as it may be disturbed by the owner or other person entitled to the benefit of any charge or encumbrance so disclosed or known.
- (3) This subsection applies to a contract of sale in the case of which there appears from the contract or is to be inferred from its circumstances an intention that the seller should transfer only such title as he or a third person may have.
- (4) In a contract to which subsection (3) above applies there is an implied term that all charges or encumbrances known to the seller and not known to the buyer have been disclosed to the buyer before the contract is made.
- (5) In a contract to which subsection (3) above applies there is also an implied term that none of the following will disturb the buyer's quiet possession of the goods, namely:
 - (a) the seller;
 - (b) in a case where the parties to the contract intend that the seller should transfer only such title as a third person may have, that person;
 - (c) anyone claiming through or under the seller or that third person otherwise than under a charge or encumbrance disclosed or known to the buyer before the contract is made.
- (5A) As regards England and Wales and Northern Ireland, the term implied by subsection (1) above is a condition and the terms implied by subsections (2), (4) and (5) above are warranties."
