



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



It is said that 'time flies' and this seems to be true in my case as I have now been dealing in antique clocks for almost 50 years since I first opened my shop in Tonbridge and that time has really flown by.

Life in the horological world has been really happy for me; it all started before the age of decimalisation, VAT and the internet and there were so many wonderful clocks available. It was all so exciting and such fun. It enabled me to handle amazing and rare examples of the early clockmakers' skills and ingenuity and also to research the history of such pieces. Over the years I have been fortunate to have worked with a very experienced team of craftsmen and restorers, a side of the business I particularly enjoyed.

Sadly, time does not stand still for any of us and now, at the age of 85, I feel I must call it a day. I have met an enormous number of interesting people throughout my career, many of whom have become great friends. In the early days I travelled to many different parts of the world, especially America, when gathering material for my various books. This was before digital photography and I had to carry all my photographic equipment with me, which was no mean feat! All the collectors I met were so kind and pleased to show me their marvellous clocks.

Bonhams have kindly agreed to handle my remaining stock, other than carriage clocks which I feel I am still able to cope with. Some of the pieces have been in our own home for a long time. I hope that anyone who might purchase something from this collection will derive much pleasure from it for many years to come. We are all only caretakers of these lovely clocks before they are handed on to the next generation to enjoy.

A GOOD LATE 19TH CENTURY FRENCH AUTOMATA SILVERED AND LACQUERED BRASS COMPENDIUM TIMEPIECE IN THE FORM OF A LIGHTHOUSE

The silvered rotating upper section surmounted by a weather vane on the shallow domed roof, over the 2.5 inch silvered Roman clock dial set opposite a conforming aneroid barometer dial with scale from 69 to 80 and five weather predictions, each dial interspersed by a thermometer, the Centigrade with alcohol tube, the Fahrenheit with mercury, all rotating atop a tapered trunk and stepped base engraved to simulate masonry and containing the automata mechanism wound on opening the lowermost door to reveal the winding square, mounted on a Belgian slate base. 48cms (19ins) high.

The clock was commissioned by Thomas Parry (1859-1914), a successful steamship and marine insurance agent at the end of the 19th century. After his death it was sold to Herbert Frood (1864-1931), a manufacturer of car parts, musician and collector of mechanical music. In time the clock was gifted to the current owners parents. The full provenance will accompany the clock.

Thomas Week(e)s ran Weeks' Mechanical Museum or Royal Mechanical Museum, Tichborne Street, Haymarket, London 1788 until the early 19th century, then Coventry Street in Piccadilly, London. Also known as Museum of Natural Curiosities and Weeks' Museum, the collection was sold by auction in 1834. Weeks was known to have signed some clocks 'semaine'.

Experiments on the properties of a mercury jar pendulum were begun by George Graham in late 1721. There was some initial fine-tuning, but the experiment lasted over three years, finally coming to a conclusion on 14th October 1725. He found the use of mercury a useful aid in negating any temperature changes. See Roberts, 'Precision Pendulum Clocks', Schiffer 2003 p68. Other methods of compensating against temperature changes in the 18th and 19th centuries were 'gridiron' pendulums of brass and steel, or those using more inert materials such as seasoned wooden rods, or later on, Invar.

The main issue with glass jars of mercury is the weak thermal conductivity of the glass. The use of cast iron jars later in the 19th century overcame this shortfall to some extent. Other methods used included the use of two or more rods (see the fine wall regulator by Frodsham sold in these rooms 10 December 2014, lot 142) and smaller jars with thinner sides. The British Museum has a fine regulator by Sigmund Rentsch which uses sixteen mercury phials, see Roberts Figs.5-2A,B,C.

As far as we are aware, this is the only known skeleton clock with such a pendulum.

It is well known that the firm of Vulliamy were happy to amend or improve clocks by other makers. The pendulum on the current clock is quite exceptional and it is not inconceivable that Vulliamy created the pendulum as a special commission for an otherwise standard pendulum skeleton clock.

An extract from the Vulliamy Workbook offers a fascinating insight into the intricate working practices behind the production of a timepiece by one of the worlds premier clockmakers in the late 1820s.

The creation of Vulliamy number 921 took some three and a half years from buying in the movement to the final examination and clean. The workbook confirms that Vulliamy used his most respected craftsmen in its manufacture; Holmden is the man behind many of Vulliamys finest movements and he was paid £7 for supplying this single fusee example. Likewise, Brownly was one of Vulliamys most trusted case makers and he was paid £2,17 shillings for the case and a further 2 shillings for the two keys. He was paid 7 shillings for French polishing the case in 1829 and another 7 shillings for French polishing it again in 1831. The record states "Post Office/ Jany. 1831" in ink, but also in pencil "March 1829 Returned by the Club....Found this Clock in the back of the Post Office Clocks" A large part of Vulliamys trade at this time was with the London clubs and the various Government Offices. Bearing in mind that Brownly was paid for French polishing the clock twice, it is possible that one of the clubs over-ordered on timepieces and, ever the business-man, Vulliamy took it back, re-polished it and sold it to the Post Office.



John Ellicott was born in 1706, the son of a clockmaker of the same name. He was one of the outstanding clockmakers of the 18th century, producing a large number of fine clocks for the home market and export. He developed his own form of temperature compensated pendulum and was instrumental in the perfection of the cylinder escapement. He was clockmaker to King George III and was paid 150 pounds per annum in this role. He worked from St Swithin's Alley, Royal Exchange, London. In 1738 he was elected a fellow of the Royal Society and later published two articles in their 'Philosophical Transactions'. He supplied portable regulators to astronomers notably, Nevil Maskelyne, Charles Mason and James Cook for the recording of the transit of Venus. He was himself a keen astronomer and observed the transit of Venus in 1761 from an observatory built in his home in Hackney.





Loomes notes that John Clowes was born around 1651. He was made a freeman of the Clockmakers Company in January 1672 described as a 'Great Clockmaker'. In 1684 he made a clock for King Charles II for the sum of £25. He was made Assistant to the Company in 1708 and Warden in 1713, but did not take up the post. He died in 1717.



DANIEL QUARE

Daniel Quare (c.1649-1724) was one of London's leading clock- and watch-makers during the last quarter of the 17th century and the first quarter of the 18th, the sheer scale of his output being second only to that of Tompion. His most significant contributions were his watch repeating mechanism, famously preferred over Tompion's design by James II, thus stifling Barlow's application for a patent, and his production of a portable barometer, for which he himself was granted a 14 year patent.

Quare might have hailed from Somerset but nothing has been discovered of his upbringing or apprenticeship, the earliest record of him being his admission to the Clockmakers' Company in London, as a Brother, on 3rd April 1671. He was living in the parish of St. Martin-le-Grand in the mid-1670s but by 1681 was in Allhallows Lombard Street. By 1686 he had made the important move to the heart of the city - Exchange Alley in the parish of St. Mary Woolnoth, taking over the premises formerly occupied by Robert Segnior. Apart from the flourishing business he is believed to have successfully speculated in stocks and funds. His sign was "The King's Arms" and his neighbours were a vintner and a confectioner.

He was also an important member of the Quaker community, but his Quaker beliefs often brought him into conflict with the authorities on account of his refusal to pay tithes, and goods of greater value than the tithe would be seized from him. Matters were eased by the Toleration Act of 1689 and he later served the Parliamentary Committee of the Meeting for Sufferings. His inability to swear an oath prevented his acceptance of the privileged post of King's Watchmaker, but he nevertheless enjoyed royal patronage. In 1691/2 he supplied William III with a repeating watch costing £69 17s 6d, and at Hampton Court a fine 10-foot year-going walnut solar/mean-time longcase clock still stands in William's bedroom. He is also known to have supplied a small dual balance or pendulum controlled travelling clock (at Windsor) and three barometers (two of which are at Hampton Court).

At Friends House is a paper by Quare explaining why he turned down the invitation of George I to become King's Watchmaker. The King told him that he could call to see him at any time and, accordingly, the Yeoman of the Guard at the Back Stairs let him "frequently go up without calling any body for leave as otherwise is usual, tho Persons of Quality". He also noted that in forty years he had served "men of the Greatest Rank of most other nations in Europe, as well as this Nation".

Quare later took into partnership his former apprentice Stephen Horseman who had married his niece Mary Savage in 1712. Towards the end of his life he retired to Croydon where he died, aged 75, on 21st March 1724; he was buried at the Quaker Burial Ground, Bunhill Fields, on the 27th. Horseman continued the Exchange Alley business until he was declared bankrupt in December 1730, whereupon Richard Peckover is believed to have taken over the goodwill.

The inclusion of a Viscount's coronet (a jewelled band with pearls) in the design of the caddy mounts is very unusual and would indicate that the original patron was a peer. Samuel Watson was commissioned to make two clocks by Charles II and was apparently Charles's 'Mathematician in Ordinary', therefore perfectly placed to take commissions from the Royal Court.

Loomes states Samuel Watson was born in Coventry and was recorded in London in 1680. He gained his freedom of the Clockmakers Company in 1692. He is particularly known for producing highly complex astronomical clocks, two for Charles II and another two for Sir Isaac Newton, he also produced a clock for measuring longitude at sea (which he offered to the clockmakers company, but was turned down), as well as more standard table and longcase clocks. Watson is also credited with being the inventor of the five minute repeating watch.

Joseph Knibb was born in 1640. It is assumed that he served his apprenticeship under his cousin Samuel Knibb in Newport Pagnell from 1655 to 1662. He began his independent career working just outside the City of Oxford, but by the mid 1660s had moved within its jurisdiction. There was some initial resentment to his becoming Free of the City and it was only through the support of the University, where he matriculated as a gardener, that he was granted Freedom in 1678 on payment of a fine of 20 nobles and a leather bucket.

In 1670 Joseph moved to London, this was the same year that his past Master, Samuel who had moved to the capital in 1662, died, and it was natural that Joseph should carry on the family firm. At this time of the very early years of the pendulum clock, London provided a wonderful opportunity for an ambitious young man with an inventive horological brain. By 1677 he had earned such a reputation that he was commissioned to supply a turret clock for Windsor Castle. More royal work followed and in 1682 Knibb was paid for work carried out for Charles II. He took on nine apprentices, including John Drew in September 1676 and Brounker Watts in January 1684. He was Assistant to the Clockmakers Company in 1689 and is well recorded in the Companys accounts until 1697 when he retired to Hanslop. He died in December 1711.

**AN IMPORTANT, RECENTLY DISCOVERED,
AND PREVIOUSLY UNRECORDED 17TH CENTURY
OLIVEWOOD AND EBONISED STRIKING TABLE CLOCK**

John Fromanteel, London, circa 1675.

The case veneered in oyster-cut and cross-banded olivewood with ebonised detailing on an oak carcass, surmounted by a central ebonised ball finial mounted on a plinth and set on a low caddy top, the right hand end of the caddy pulling outward to reveal a secret oak-lined key drawer, and further set to each corner with a smaller ball finial on a plinth, the cornice with overhanging 'rain lip' over the blind fret-carved cornice of long scrolls with foliate terminals set against a later gold-decorated ground, supported on three-quarter ebonised spirally twisted Doric columns to the front and matching quarter columns to the rear on a plinth decorated with oyster-cut panels, five to each side and eight along the front (door keys, minor mouldings and lowermost table plinth now lacking). All veneered on an oak carcass, the mouldings set on pine, with evidence of old woodworm.

The dial measuring 9 inches square and set to each corner with a finely cast winged cherubs head spandrel, the chapter ring measuring $1 \frac{9}{16}$ ths of an inch in width with an outer minute band marked in Arabic 5s, each Roman hour numeral divided by a fleur de lyse half-hour marker, and an inner quarter hour track, the matted centre with square chamfered date aperture and original blued steel hands, the hour with serpentine root and openwork shaft, the tip missing, the minute with bold S-curve root and unusually rounded lower section, mounted to the dial via four dial feet, all latched to the frontplate.

The movement set on a pair of upright blocks and secured into the case via two turnbuckles set behind the dial at III and IX, the rectangular brass movement plates measuring $8 \frac{1}{2}$ inches by $6 \frac{1}{4}$ inches united by seven delicate knopped and finned pillars latched to the frontplate, the going train with squat gut fusee, (gut now broken) originally with bolt and shutter maintaining power, terminating in a verge escapement with knife-edge on the original bridge cock with internally mounted (later?) 'banking' pins, the rod in brass and terminating in a pear-shaped bob, the bridge with decoratively shaped upper edge, the strike train with similar squat fusee, the numbered Arabic countwheel mounted to the rear with a heavy central boss engraved with a 23-leaved flowerhead, striking on a shallow bell mounted on a curved steel support with trip lever, the steel hammer spring mounted in a substantial brass S-scroll shaped foot, the backplate bordered by a single line framing the largely symmetrical pattern of flowerheads and foliate scrolls, with squared U-shaped pendulum holdfast, signed in a foliate cartouche Johannes Fromanteel, Londini Fecit 56cms (22ins) high.


Ahasuerus Fromanteel's 1658 advert has ensured that his name will be forever associated with the introduction of the pendulum clock to Britain, but one could argue that a more involved role was played by his lesser-known son John. It was after all, John, and not Ahasuerus, who travelled to The Hague in September 1657 and worked alongside Salomon Coster at the bench in his workshop, discussing the new technologies before him. It was John who returned to London and imparted the knowledge to his father and he was surely involved in the production and finishing of the earliest clocks such as the sublime 'Cupid Fromanteel' sold in these rooms June 2011.

John was the eldest of three sons. He was born in 1638 and apprenticed to his father in April 1652 at the age of fourteen. He later transferred to his brother in law, Thomas Loomes from whom he was freed in July 1663. He died sometime before 1692. (See Loomes, 'Clockmakers of Britain', Mayfield Books, 2014, p.208). It has been suggested that those clocks signed by him were made between circa 1667 when his father left for Holland, and circa 1680 when he moved with his brother (Ahasuerus II) to Vijendam, Amsterdam, giving a window of production of only 12 years or so. Analysis of surviving clocks implies that John's table clocks are far rarer than his longcases, why this should be so is open to conjecture – was it cost? Or perhaps once the long pendulum had been introduced, circa 1670, buyers were keen to have as accurate and modern a clock as possible?

An ebony table clock by John with a drawer to the base was featured in these rooms in December 2014 and is illustrated in Dawson, Drover Parkes, 'Early English Clocks', Woodbridge, 1982, plate 239. Like the current clock, it has ebonised spirally twisted three-quarter and quarters columns to each corner, although they support brass Composite capitals rather than Doric. Interestingly, the method of securing the movement into the case is the same in both clocks – the movement is raised on two narrow upright blocks rather than a horizontal seatboard. Ball finials raised on plinths decorate the top of both clocks rather than the cast brass urn finials that his contemporaries favoured – this appears to be something of a house style with only two Fromanteel clocks known to us to have anything but ball finials (see the 'Cupola' clock by Ahasuerus of c.1666, Dawson, Drover Parkes plate 193 and a rosewood cased example by John advertised by Bobinet in Antiquarian Horology, September 2013).

Ebony was by far the most common case veneer in the early days of spring clocks. The use of walnut or olivewood is very rare, although two other cases do bear close similarities and may well have been made in the same workshop. One is by Thomas Tompion dated to circa 1673 and the other by William Knottesford circa 1672. The Tompion is discussed and illustrated in Evans et al, 'Thomas Tompion 300 Years', Water Lane Publishing 2013, pages 310 and 311. The Knottesford featured in the Exhibition 'Huygen's Legacy: The Golden Age of the Pendulum Clock', held at Paleis Het Loo, 2004, item 48. Like the current lot, the case is olivewood, has ebonised spirally twisted columns and a drawer to the caddy top.

Lichfield is a small but very historic city in Staffordshire situated about 15 miles north of Birmingham. It was an important town from the early period, in 2009 the largest deposit of Anglo-Saxon gold and silver - 'The Staffordshire Hoard' - was unearthed in a small village nearby. The Hoard contains over 3,500 high quality martial items fashioned from 6.5kg of gold and silver, as well as cloisonne-decorated and garnet-mounted jewellery. In the 18th century, Samuel Johnson, who was born in the city, described it as "a city of philosophers", notable inhabitants of the time included David Garrick and Erasmus Darwin.

The clock is based on the West facade of Lichfield Cathedral. It was completed circa 1300 and its intricate Gothic design appealed to the Victorian interest in early architecture. An example of the frame was reproduced in the 1865 catalogue by Smith's of Clerkenwell and two such examples are illustrated in Roberts, 'British Skeleton Clocks, ACC 1987, figure 2/28. Another model with platform escapement is illustrated in Royer-Collard, 'Skeleton Clocks', NAG Press, London 1969, figure 3-41.

A Thomas Yates is recorded in Preston c.1848-1878, and it is likely that he is related to the retailer.

This clock is discussed and illustrated in J.A. Neale: Joseph and Thomas Windmills, Clock and Watch Makers 1671-1737, AHS 1999, Figure 5.65. The calendar dial in the arch is a typical Windmills feature and while the current retaining brackets are replacements, it is known that Windmills used plain steel brackets just like this. The size of the clock and its wonderfully legible dial may well indicate that it was a special commission for a 'public' area - such as the reception room of a grand house.



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Joseph Windmills has always been a highly regarded maker of clocks and watches. Brian Loomes records that he was made free of the Clockmakers Company in 1671 and that he took on numerous apprentices, including his son Thomas between 1686 and 1695. He was made Assistant to the Clockmakers Company in 1691, Warden in 1699 and Master in 1702 and is recorded attending until 1720. In 1710 he took over the contract to care for the clocks at the Tower of London from Thomas Tompion. A full account of his clocks and family is given in J. A. Neale, "Joseph and Thomas Windmills, Clock and Watch Makers 1671-1737", The Antiquarian Horological Society, 1999.



Alterations

4. CONDUCT OF THE SALE

Our *Sales* are public auctions which persons may attend and you should take the opportunity to do so. You should therefore check the date and starting time of the *Sale*, whether there have been any withdrawals or late entries. You should be alert to this possibility of changes and ask if there have been any.

7. BUYER'S PREMIUM AND OTHER CHARGES PAYABLE BY THE BUYER

If paying by bank transfer, the amount received after the deduction of any bank fees and/or conversion of the currency of payment to pounds sterling must not be less than the sterling amount payable, as set out on the invoice.

Other than any liability of the *Seller* to the *Buyer* of a *Lot* under the *Contract for Sale*, neither we nor the *Seller* are liable (whether in negligence or otherwise) for any error or misdescription or omission in any *Description* of a *Lot* or any *Estimate* in respect of it, whether contained in the *Catalogue* or otherwise, whether given orally or in writing and whether given before or during the *Sale*. Neither we nor the *Seller* will be liable for any loss of *Business*, profits, revenue or income, or for loss of reputation, or for disruption to *Business* or wasted time on the part of management or staff, or for indirect losses or consequential damages of any kind, irrespective in any case of the nature, volume or source of the loss or damage alleged to be suffered, and irrespective of whether the said loss or damage is caused by or claimed in respect of any negligence, other tort, breach of contract (if any) or statutory duty, restitutionary claim or otherwise. As clocks and watches often contain fine and complex mechanisms, *Bidders* should be aware that a general service, change of battery or further repair work, for which the *Buyer* is solely responsible, may be necessary. *Bidders* should be aware that the importation of watches such as Rolex, Frank Muller and Corum into the United States is highly restricted. These watches may not be shipped to the USA and can only be imported personally.

17. FIREARMS – PROOF, CONDITION AND CERTIFICATION

Proof of Firearms

The term "proof exemption" indicates that a firearm has been examined at a Proof House, but not proved, as either (a) it was deemed of interest and not intended for use, or (b) ammunition was not available. In either case, the firearm must be regarded as unsafe to fire unless subsequently proved. Firearms proved for Black Powder should not be used with smokeless ammunition.

The term "Certificate of Unprovability" indicates that a firearm has been examined at a Proof House and is deemed both unsuitable for proof and use. Reproof is required before any such firearm is to be used.

Guns Sold as Parts

Barrels of guns sold as parts will only be made available for sleeving and measurements once rendered unserviceable according to the Gun Barrel Proof Act of 1968 to 1978 and the Rules of Proof.

Condition of Firearms

Comment in this *Catalogue* is restricted, in general, to exceptional condition and to those defects that might affect the immediate safety of a firearm in normal use. An intending *Bidder* unable to make technical examinations and assessments is recommended to seek advice from a gunmaker or from a modern firearms specialist. All prospective *Bidders* are advised to consult the ° of bore and wall-thickness measurements posted in the saleroom and available from the department. *Bidders* should note that guns are stripped only where there is a strong indication of a mechanical malfunction. Stripping is not, otherwise, undertaken. Guns intended for use should be stripped and cleaned beforehand. Hammer guns should have their rebound mechanisms checked before use. Should you not already be in possession of such an authority or exemption, you are required to initially pay a deposit of 95% of the total invoice with the balance of 5% payable on presentation of your valid certificate or licence showing your authority to hold the firearm(s) concerned.

Please be advised that if a successful *Bidder* is then unable to produce the correct paperwork, the *Lot(s)* will be reoffered by *Bonhams* in the next appropriate *Sale*, on standard terms for *Sellers*, and you will be responsible for any loss incurred by *Bonhams* on the original *Sale* to you.

Lots marked with a 'S58' and bearing yellow labels are for obsolete calibres and no licence is required unless ammunition is held.

Unmarked *Lots* require no licence.

19. JEWELLERY

Gemstones

Historically many gemstones have been subjected to a variety of treatments to enhance their appearance. Sapphires and rubies are routinely heat treated to improve their colour and clarity, similarly emeralds are frequently treated with oils or resin for the same purpose. Other treatments such as staining, irradiation or coating may have been used on other gemstones. These treatments may be permanent, whilst others may need special care or re-treatment over the years to retain their appearance. *Bidders* should be aware that *Estimates* assume that gemstones may have been subjected to such treatments. A number of laboratories issue certificates that give more detailed *Descriptions* of gemstones. However there may not be consensus between different laboratories on the degrees, or types of treatment for any particular gemstone. In the event that *Bonhams* has been given or has obtained certificates for any *Lot* in the *Sale* these certificates will be disclosed in the *Catalogue*. Although, as a matter of policy, *Bonhams* endeavours to provide certificates from recognised laboratories for certain gemstones, it is not feasible to obtain certificates for each *Lot*. - "Manner of Jacopo Bassano": in our opinion a work in the style of the artist and of a later date;
- "After Jacopo Bassano": in our opinion, a copy of a known work of the artist;
- "Signed and/or dated and/or inscribed": in our opinion the signature and/or date and/or inscription are from the hand of the artist;
- "Bears a signature and/or date and/or inscription": in our opinion the signature and/or date and/or inscription have been added by another hand.

22. PORCELAIN AND GLASS

Damage and Restoration

For your guidance, in our *Catalogues* we detail, as far as practicable, recorded all significant defects, cracks and restoration. Such practicable *Descriptions* of damage cannot be definitive, and in providing *Condition Reports*, we cannot *Guarantee* that there are no other defects present which have not been mentioned. *Bidders* should satisfy themselves by inspection, as to the condition of each *Lot*. Because of the difficulty in determining whether an item of glass has been repolished, in our *Catalogues* reference is only made to visible chips and cracks. 24. WINE

Lots which are lying under Bond and those liable to VAT may not be available for immediate collection.

Examining the wines

It is occasionally possible to provide a pre-Sale tasting for larger parcels (as defined below). This is generally limited to more recent and everyday drinking wines. Please contact the department for details.

It is not our policy to inspect every unopened case. In the case of wines older than 20 years the boxes will usually have been opened and levels and appearance noted in the *Catalogue* where necessary. You should make proper allowance for variations in ullage levels and conditions of corks, capsules and labels.

Corks and Ullages

Ullage refers to the space between the base of the cork and the wine. Ullage levels for Bordeaux shaped bottles are only normally noted when below the neck and for Burgundy, Alsace, German and Cognac shaped bottles when greater than 4 centimetres (cm). Acceptable ullage levels increase with age; generally acceptable levels are as follows:

Under 15 years old – into neck or less than 4cm
15 to 30 years old – top shoulder (ts) or up to 5cm
Over 30 years old – high shoulder (hs) or up to 6cm

It should be noted that ullages may change between publication of the *Catalogue* and the *Sale* and that corks may fail as a result of transporting the wine. We will only accept responsibility for *Descriptions* of condition at the time of publication of the *Catalogue* and cannot accept responsibility for any loss resulting from failure of corks either before or after this point.

Options to buy parcels

A parcel is a number of *Lots* of identical size of the same wine, bottle size and *Description*. The *Buyer* of any of these *Lots* has the option to accept some or all of the remaining *Lots* in the parcel at the same price, although such options will be at the *Auctioneer's* sole discretion. Under this contract the *Seller's* liability in respect of the quality of the *Lot*, its fitness for any purpose and its conformity with any *Description* is limited. You are strongly advised to examine the *Lot* for yourself and/or obtain an independent examination of it before you buy it.

1 THE CONTRACT

- 1.1 These terms govern the *Contract for Sale* of the *Lot* by the *Seller* to the *Buyer*.
- 1.2 The Definitions and Glossary contained in Appendix 3 in the *Catalogue* are incorporated into this *Contract for Sale* and a separate copy can also be provided by *Bonhams* on request. Where words and phrases are used which are in the List of Definitions, they are printed in italics.
- 1.3 The *Seller* sells the *Lot* as the principal to the *Contract for Sale*, such contract being made between the *Seller* and you through *Bonhams* which acts in the sole capacity as the *Seller's* agent and not as an additional principal. However, if the *Catalogue* states that *Bonhams* sells the *Lot* as principal, or such a statement is made by an announcement by the *Auctioneer*, or by a notice at the *Sale*, or an insert in the *Catalogue*, then *Bonhams* is the *Seller* for the purposes of this agreement.

- 1.4 The contract is made on the fall of the *Auctioneer's* hammer in respect of the *Lot* when it is knocked down to you.

2 SELLER'S UNDERTAKINGS

APPENDIX 2

BUYER'S AGREEMENT

IMPORTANT: These terms may be changed in advance of the Sale of the Lot to you, by the setting out of different terms in the Catalogue for the Sale and/or by placing an insert in the Catalogue and/or by notices at the Sale venue and/or by oral announcements before and during the Sale at the Sale venue. You should be alert to this possibility of changes and ask in advance of bidding if there have been any.

1 THE CONTRACT

- 1.1 These terms govern the contract between *Bonhams* personally and the *Buyer*, being the person to whom a Lot has been knocked down by the *Auctioneer*.
- 1.2 The Definitions and Glossary contained in Appendix 3 to the Catalogue for the Sale are incorporated into this agreement and a separate copy can also be provided by us on request. Where words and phrases which are defined in the List of Definitions are used in this agreement, they are printed in italics. Reference is made in this agreement to information printed in the *Notice to Bidders*, printed in the Catalogue for the Sale, and where such information is referred to it is incorporated into this agreement.
- 1.3 Except as specified in paragraph 4 of the *Notice to Bidders* the Contract for Sale of the Lot between you and the Seller is made on the fall of the *Auctioneer's* hammer in respect of the Lot, when it is knocked down to you. At that moment a separate contract is also made between you and *Bonhams* on the terms in this *Buyer's Agreement*.
- 1.4 We act as agents for the Seller and are not answerable or personally responsible to you for any breach of contract or other default by the Seller, unless *Bonhams* sells the Lot as principal.
- 1.5 Our personal obligations to you are governed by this agreement and we agree, subject to the terms below, to the following obligations:
- 1.5.1 we will, until the date and time specified in the *Notice to Bidders* or otherwise notified to you, store the Lot in accordance with paragraph 5;
- 1.5.2 subject to any power of the Seller or us to refuse to release the Lot to you, we will release the Lot to you in accordance with paragraph 4 once you have paid to us, in cleared funds, everything due to us and the Seller;
- 1.5.3 we will provide guarantees in the terms set out in paragraphs 9 and 10.
- 1.6 We do not make or give and do not agree to make or give any contractual promise, undertaking, obligation, *Guarantee*, warranty, representation of fact in relation to any *Description* of the Lot or any *Estimate* in relation to it, nor of the accuracy or completeness of any *Description* or *Estimate* which may have been made by us or on our behalf or by or on behalf of the Seller (whether made orally or in writing, including in the Catalogue or on *Bonhams' Website*, or by conduct, or otherwise), and whether made before or after this agreement or prior to or during the Sale. No such *Description* or *Estimate* is incorporated into this agreement between you and us. Any such *Description* or *Estimate*, if made by us or on our behalf, was (unless *Bonhams* itself sells the Lot as principal) made as agent on behalf of the Seller.

2 PERFORMANCE OF THE CONTRACT FOR SALE

You undertake to us personally that you will observe and comply with all your obligations and undertakings to the Seller under the Contract for Sale in respect of the Lot.

3 PAYMENT

- 3.1 Unless agreed in writing between you and us or as otherwise set out in the *Notice to Bidders*, you must pay to us by not later than 4.30pm on the second working day following the Sale:
- 3.1.1 the *Purchase Price* for the Lot;
- 3.1.2 a *Buyer's Premium* in accordance with the rates set out in the *Notice to Bidders* on each lot, and
- 3.1.3 if the Lot is marked [AR], an *Additional Premium* which is calculated and payable in accordance with the *Notice to Bidders* together with VAT on that sum if applicable so that all sums due to us are cleared funds by the seventh working day after the Sale.
- 3.2 You must also pay us on demand any *Expenses* payable pursuant to this agreement.
- 3.3 All payments to us must be made in the currency in which the Sale was conducted, using, unless otherwise agreed by us in writing, one of the methods of payment set out in the *Notice to Bidders*. Our invoices will only be addressed to the registered Bidder unless the Bidder is acting as an agent for a named principal and we have approved that arrangement, in which case we will address the invoice to the principal.
- 3.4 Unless otherwise stated in this agreement all sums payable to us will be subject to VAT at the appropriate rate and VAT will be payable by you on all such sums.
- 3.5 We may deduct and retain for our own benefit from the monies paid by you to us the *Buyer's Premium*, the *Commission* payable by the Seller in respect of the Lot, any *Expenses* and VAT and any interest earned and/or incurred until payment to the Seller.
- 3.6 Time will be of the essence in relation to any payment payable to us. If you do not pay the *Purchase Price*, or any other sum due to us in accordance with this paragraph 3, we will have the rights set out in paragraph 7 below.
- 3.7 Where a number of Lots have been knocked down to you, any monies we receive from you will be applied firstly pro-rata to pay the *Purchase Price* of each Lot and secondly pro-rata to pay all amounts due to *Bonhams*.

4 COLLECTION OF THE LOT

- 4.1 Subject to any power of the Seller or us to refuse to release the Lot to you, once you have paid to us, in cleared funds, everything due to the Seller and to us, we will release the Lot to you or as you may direct us in writing. The Lot will only be released on production of a buyer collection document, obtained from our cashier's office.
- 4.2 You must collect and remove the Lot at your own expense by the date and time specified in the *Notice to Bidders*, or if no date is specified, by 4.30pm on the seventh day after the Sale.
- 4.3 For the period referred to in paragraph 4.2, the Lot can be collected from the address referred to in the *Notice to Bidders* for collection on the days and times specified in the *Notice to Bidders*. Thereafter, the Lot may be removed elsewhere for storage and you must enquire from us as to when and where you can collect it, although this information will usually be set out in the *Notice to Bidders*.

- 4.4 If you have not collected the Lot by the date specified in the *Notice to Bidders*, you authorise us, acting as your agent and on your behalf, to enter into a contract (the "*Storage Contract*") with the *Storage Contractor* for the storage of the Lot on the then current standard terms and conditions agreed between *Bonhams* and the *Storage Contractor* (copies of which are available on request). If the Lot is stored at our premises storage fees at our current daily rates (currently a minimum of £3 plus VAT per Lot per day) will be payable from the expiry of the period referred to in paragraph 4.2. These storage fees form part of our *Expenses*.

11 BOOKS MISSING TEXT OR ILLUSTRATIONS

Where the *Lot* is made up wholly of a *Book* or *Books* and any *Book* does not contain text or illustrations (in either case referred to as a "non-conforming *Lot*"), we undertake a personal responsibility for such a non-conforming *Lot* in accordance with the terms of this paragraph, if:

the original invoice was made out by us to you in respect of the *Lot* and that invoice has been paid; and

you notify us in writing as soon as reasonably practicable after you have become aware that the *Lot* is or may be a non-conforming *Lot*, and in any event within 20 days after the *Sale* (or such longer period as we may agree in writing) that the *Lot* is a non-conforming *Lot*; and

within 20 days of the date of the relevant *Sale* (or such longer period as we may agree in writing) you return the *Lot* to us in the same condition as it was at the time of the *Sale*, accompanied by written evidence that the *Lot* is a non-conforming *Lot* and details of the *Sale* and *Lot* number sufficient to identify the *Lot*.

the *Entry* in the *Catalogue* in respect of the *Lot* indicates that the rights given by this paragraph do not apply to it; or

the *Entry* in the *Catalogue* in respect of the *Lot* reflected the then accepted general opinion of scholars and experts or fairly indicated that there was a conflict of such opinion; or

it can be established that the *Lot* is a non-conforming *Lot* only by means of a process not generally accepted for use until after the date on which the *Catalogue* was published or by means of a process which it was unreasonable in all the circumstances for us to have employed; or

the *Lot* comprises atlases, maps, autographs, manuscripts, extra illustrated books, music or periodical publications; or

the *Lot* was listed in the *Catalogue* under "collections" or "collections and various" or the *Lot* was stated in the *Catalogue* to comprise or contain a collection, issue or *Books* which are undescribed or the missing text or illustrations are referred to or the relevant parts of the *Book* contain blanks, half titles or advertisements.

If we are reasonably satisfied that a *Lot* is a non-conforming *Lot*, we will (as principal) purchase the *Lot* from you and you will transfer the title to the *Lot* in question to us, with full title guarantee, free from any liens, charges, encumbrances and adverse claims and we will pay to you an amount equal to the sum of the *Purchase Price* and *Buyer's Premium* paid by you in respect of the *Lot*.

The benefit of paragraph 10 is personal to, and incapable of assignment by, you and if you sell or otherwise dispose of your interest in the *Lot*, all rights and benefits under this paragraph will cease.

12 MISCELLANEOUS

12.1 You may not assign either the benefit or burden of this agreement.

12.2 Our failure or delay in enforcing or exercising any power or right under this agreement will not operate or be deemed to operate as a waiver of our rights under it except to the extent of any express waiver given to you in writing. Any such waiver will not affect our ability subsequently to enforce any right arising under this agreement.

12.3 If either party to this agreement is prevented from performing that party's respective obligations under this agreement by circumstances beyond its reasonable control or if performance of its obligations would by reason of such circumstances give rise to a significantly increased financial cost to it, that party will not, for so long as such circumstances prevail, be required to perform such obligations. This paragraph does not apply to the obligations imposed on you by paragraph 3.

12.4 Any notice or other communication to be given under this agreement must be in writing and may be delivered by hand or sent by first class post or air mail or fax transmission (if to *Bonhams* marked for the attention of the Company Secretary), to the address or fax number of the relevant party given in the *Contract Form* (unless notice of any change of address is given in writing). It is the responsibility of the sender of the notice or communication to ensure that it is received in a legible form within any applicable time period.

12.5 If any term or any part of any term of this agreement is held to be unenforceable or invalid, such unenforceability or invalidity will not affect the enforceability and validity of the remaining terms or the remainder of the relevant term.

12.6 References in this agreement to *Bonhams* will, where appropriate, include reference to *Bonhams'* officers, employees and agents.

12.7 The headings used in this agreement are for convenience only and will not affect its interpretation.

12.8 In this agreement "including" means "including, without limitation".

12.9 References to the singular will include reference to the plural (and vice versa) and reference to any one gender will include reference to the other genders.

12.10 Reference to a numbered paragraph is to a paragraph of this agreement.

12.11 Save as expressly provided in paragraph 12.12 nothing in this agreement confers (or purports to confer) on any person who is not a party to this agreement any benefit conferred by, or the right to enforce any term of, this agreement.

12.12 Where this agreement confers an immunity from, and/or an exclusion or restriction of, the responsibility and/or liability of *Bonhams*, it will also operate in favour and for the benefit of *Bonhams'* holding company and the subsidiaries of such holding company and the successors and assigns of *Bonhams* and of such companies and of any officer, employee and agent of *Bonhams* and such companies, each of whom will be entitled to rely on the relevant immunity and/or exclusion and/or restriction within and for the purposes of Contracts (Rights of Third Parties) Act 1999, which enables the benefit of a contract to be extended to a person who is not a party to the contract, and generally at law.

13 GOVERNING LAW

All transactions to which this agreement applies and all connected matters will be governed by and construed in accordance with the laws of that part of the United Kingdom where the *Sale* takes (or is to take) place and we and you each submit to the exclusive jurisdiction of the courts of that part of the United Kingdom, save that we may bring proceedings against you in any other court of competent jurisdiction to the extent permitted by the laws of the relevant jurisdiction. *Bonhams* has a complaints procedure in place.

DATA PROTECTION – USE OF YOUR INFORMATION

Where we obtain any personal information about you, we shall only use it in accordance with the terms of our Privacy Policy (subject to any additional specific consent(s) you may have given at the time your information was disclosed). A copy of our Privacy Policy can be found on our *Website* www.bonhams.com or requested by post from Customer Services Department, 101 New Bond Street, London W1S 1SR, United Kingdom or by email from info@bonhams.com.

APPENDIX 3

DEFINITIONS AND GLOSSARY

Where these Definitions and Glossary are incorporated, the following words and phrases used have (unless the context otherwise requires) the meanings given to them below. The Glossary is to assist you to understand words and phrases which have a specific legal meaning with which you may not be familiar.

LIST OF DEFINITIONS

"**Additional Premium**" a premium, calculated in accordance with the *Notice to Bidders*, to cover *Bonhams'* Expenses relating to the payment of royalties under the Artists Resale Right Regulations 2006 which is payable by the *Buyer* to *Bonhams* on any *Lot* marked [AR] which sells for a *Hammer Price* which together with the *Buyer's Premium* (but excluding any VAT) equals or exceeds 1000 euros (converted into the currency of the *Sale* using the European Central Bank Reference rate prevailing on the date of the *Sale*).
"**Auctioneer**" the representative of *Bonhams* conducting the *Sale*.

"Bidder" a person who has completed a *Bidding Form*.

"Bidding Form" our Bidding Registration Form, our Absentee Bidding Form or our Telephone Bidding Form.

"Bonhams" Bonhams 1793 Limited or its successors or assigns. *Bonhams* is also referred to in the *Buyer's Agreement*, the Conditions of Business and the *Notice to Bidders* by the words "we", "us" and "our".

"Book" a printed *Book* offered for *Sale* at a specialist *Book Sale*.

"Business" includes any trade, *Business* and profession.

"Buyer" the person to whom a *Lot* is knocked down by the *Auctioneer*. The *Buyer* is also referred to in the *Contract for Sale* and the *Buyer's Agreement* by the words "you" and "your".

"Buyer's Agreement" the contract entered into by *Bonhams* with the *Buyer* (see Appendix 2 in the *Catalogue*).

"Buyer's Premium" the sum calculated on the *Hammer Price* at the rates stated in the *Notice to Bidders*.

"Catalogue" the *Catalogue* relating to the relevant *Sale*, including any representation of the *Catalogue* published on our *Website*.

"Commission" the *Commission* payable by the *Seller* to *Bonhams* calculated at the rates stated in the *Contract Form*.

"Condition Report" a report on the physical condition of a *Lot* provided to a *Bidder* or potential *Bidder* by *Bonhams* on behalf of the *Seller*.

"Conditions of Sale" the *Notice to Bidders*, *Contract for Sale*, *Buyer's Agreement* and Definitions and Glossary.

"Consignment Fee" a fee payable to *Bonhams* by the *Seller* calculated at rates set out in the Conditions of Business.

"Consumer" a natural person who is acting for the relevant purpose outside his trade, *Business* or profession.

"Contract Form" the *Contract Form*, or vehicle *Entry form*, as applicable, signed by or on behalf of the *Seller* listing the *Lots* to be offered for *Sale* by *Bonhams*.

"Contract for Sale" the *Sale* contract entered into by the *Seller* with the *Buyer* (see Appendix 1 in the *Catalogue*).

"Contractual Description" the only *Description* of the *Lot* (being that part of the *Entry* about the *Lot* in the *Catalogue* which is in bold letters, any photograph (except for the colour) and the contents of any *Condition Report*) to which the *Seller* undertakes in the *Contract for Sale* the *Lot* corresponds.

"Description" any statement or representation in any way descriptive of the *Lot*, including any statement or representation relating to its authorship, attribution, condition, provenance, authenticity, style, period, age, suitability, quality, origin, value, estimated selling price (including the *Hammer Price*).

"Entry" a written statement in the *Catalogue* identifying the *Lot* and its *Lot* number which may contain a *Description* and illustration(s) relating to the *Lot*.

"Estimate" a statement of our opinion of the range within which the hammer is likely to fall.

"Expenses" charges and *Expenses* paid or payable by *Bonhams* in respect of the *Lot* including legal *Expenses*, banking charges and *Expenses* incurred as a result of an electronic transfer of money, charges and *Expenses* for loss and damage cover, insurance, *Catalogue* and other reproductions and illustrations, any customs duties, advertising, packing or shipping costs, reproductions rights' fees, taxes, levies, costs of testing, searches or enquiries, preparation of the *Lot* for *Sale*, storage charges, removal charges, removal charges or costs of collection from the *Seller* as the *Seller's* agents or from a defaulting *Buyer*, plus *VAT* if applicable.

"Forgery" an imitation intended by the maker or any other person to deceive as to authorship, attribution, origin, authenticity, style, date, age, period, provenance, culture, source or composition, which at the date of the *Sale* had a value materially less than it would have had if the *Lot* had not been such an imitation, and which is not stated to be such an imitation in any description of the *Lot*. A *Lot* will not be a *Forgery* by reason of any damage to, and/or restoration and/or modification work (including repainting or over painting) having been carried out on the *Lot*, where that damage, restoration or modification work (as the case may be) does not substantially affect the identity of the *Lot* as one conforming to the *Description* of the *Lot*.

"Guarantee" the obligation undertaken personally by *Bonhams* to the *Buyer* in respect of any *Forgery* and, in the case of specialist *Stamp Sales* and/or specialist *Book Sales*, a *Lot* made up of a *Stamp* or *Stamps* or a *Book* or *Books* as set out in the *Buyer's Agreement*.

"Hammer Price" the price in the currency in which the *Sale* is conducted at which a *Lot* is knocked down by the *Auctioneer*.

"Loss and Damage Warranty" means the warranty described in paragraph 8.2 of the Conditions of Business.

"Loss and Damage Warranty Fee" means the fee described in paragraph 8.2.3 of the Conditions of Business.

"Lot" any item consigned to *Bonhams* with a view to its *Sale* at auction or by private treaty (and reference to any *Lot* will include, unless the context otherwise requires, reference to individual items comprised in a group of two or more items offered for *Sale* as one *Lot*).

"Motoring Catalogue Fee" a fee payable by the *Seller* to *Bonhams* in consideration of the additional work undertaken by *Bonhams* in respect of the cataloguing of motor vehicles and in respect of the promotion of *Sales* of motor vehicles.

"New Bond Street" means *Bonhams'* saleroom at 101 New Bond Street, London W1S 1SR.

"Notional Charges" the amount of *Commission* and *VAT* which would have been payable if the *Lot* had been sold at the *Notional Price*.

"Notional Fee" the sum on which the *Consignment Fee* payable to *Bonhams* by the *Seller* is based and which is calculated according to the formula set out in the Conditions of Business.

"Notional Price" the latest in time of the average of the high and low *Estimates* given by us to you or stated in the *Catalogue* or, if no such *Estimates* have been given or stated, the *Reserve* applicable to the *Lot*.

"Notice to Bidders" the notice printed at the back or front of our *Catalogues*.

"Purchase Price" the aggregate of the *Hammer Price* and *VAT* on the *Hammer Price* (where applicable), the *Buyer's Premium* and *VAT* on the *Buyer's Premium* and any *Expenses*.

"Reserve" the minimum price at which a *Lot* may be sold (whether at auction or by private treaty).

"Sale" the auction *Sale* at which a *Lot* is to be offered for *Sale* by *Bonhams*.

"Sale Proceeds" the net amount due to the *Seller* from the *Sale* of a *Lot*, being the *Hammer Price* less the *Commission*, any *VAT* chargeable thereon, *Expenses* and any other amount due to us in whatever capacity and howsoever arising.

"Seller" the person who offers the *Lot* for *Sale* named on the *Contract Form*. Where the person so named identifies on the form another person as acting as his agent, or where the person named on the *Contract Form* acts as an agent for a principal (whether such agency is disclosed to *Bonhams* or not), "*Seller*" includes both the agent and the principal who shall be jointly and severally liable as such. The *Seller* is also referred to in the Conditions of Business by the words "you" and "your".

"Specialist Examination" a visual examination of a *Lot* by a specialist on the *Lot*.

"Stamp" means a postage *Stamp* offered for *Sale* at a Specialist *Stamp Sale*.

"Standard Examination" a visual examination of a *Lot* by a non-specialist member of *Bonhams'* staff.

"Storage Contract" means the contract described in paragraph 8.3.3 of the Conditions of Business or paragraph 4.4 of the *Buyer's Agreement* (as appropriate).

"Storage Contractor" means the company identified as such in the *Catalogue*.

"Terrorism" means any act or threatened act of terrorism, whether any person is acting alone or on behalf of or in connection with any organisation(s) and/or government(s), committed for political, religious or ideological or similar purposes including, but not limited to, the intention to influence any government and/or put the public or any section of the public into fear.

"Trust Account" the bank account of *Bonhams* into which all sums received in respect of the *Purchase Price* of any *Lot* will be paid, such account to be a distinct and separate account to *Bonhams'* normal business bank account.

"VAT" value added tax at the prevailing rate at the date of the *Sale* in the United Kingdom.

"Website" *Bonhams Website* at www.bonhams.com

"Withdrawal Notice" the *Seller's* written notice to *Bonhams* revoking *Bonhams'* instructions to sell a *Lot*.

"Without Reserve" where there is no minimum price at which a *Lot* may be sold (whether at auction or by private treaty).

GLOSSARY

The following expressions have specific legal meanings with which you may not be familiar. The following glossary is intended to give you an understanding of those expressions but is not intended to limit their legal meanings:

"artist's resale right": the right of the creator of a work of art to receive a payment on *Sales* of that work subsequent to the original *Sale* of that work by the creator of it as set out in the Artists Resale Right Regulations 2006.

"bailee": a person to whom goods are entrusted.

"indemnity": an obligation to put the person who has the benefit of the indemnity in the same position in which he would have been, had the circumstances giving rise to the indemnity not arisen and the expression "indemnify" is construed accordingly.

"interpleader proceedings": proceedings in the Courts to determine ownership or rights over a *Lot*.

"knocked down": when a *Lot* is sold to a *Bidder*, indicated by the fall of the hammer at the *Sale*.

"lien": a right for the person who has possession of the *Lot* to retain possession of it.

"risk": the possibility that a *Lot* may be lost, damaged, destroyed, stolen, or deteriorate in condition or value.

"title": the legal and equitable right to the ownership of a *Lot*.

"tort": a legal wrong done to someone to whom the wrong doer has a duty of care.

SALE OF GOODS ACT 1979

The following is an extract from the Sale of Goods Act 1979:

"Section 12 Implied terms about title, etc

- (1) In a contract of sale, other than one to which subsection (3) below applies, there is an implied term on the part of the seller that in the case of a sale he has a right to sell the goods, and in the case of an agreement to sell he will have such a right at the time when the property is to pass.
- (2) In a contract of sale, other than one to which subsection (3) below applies, there is also an implied term that-
 - (a) the goods are free, and will remain free until the time when the property is to pass, from any charge or encumbrance not disclosed or known to the buyer before the contract is made, and
 - (b) the buyer will enjoy quiet possession of the goods except in so far as it may be disturbed by the owner or other person entitled to the benefit of any charge or encumbrance so disclosed or known.
- (3) This subsection applies to a contract of sale in the case of which there appears from the contract or is to be inferred from its circumstances an intention that the seller should transfer only such title as he or a third person may have.
- (4) In a contract to which subsection (3) above applies there is an implied term that all charges or encumbrances known to the seller and not known to the buyer have been disclosed to the buyer before the contract is made.
- (5) In a contract to which subsection (3) above applies there is also an implied term that none of the following will disturb the buyer's quiet possession of the goods, namely:
 - (a) the seller;
 - (b) in a case where the parties to the contract intend that the seller should transfer only such title as a third person may have, that person;
 - (c) anyone claiming through or under the seller or that third person otherwise than under a charge or encumbrance disclosed or known to the buyer before the contract is made.
- (5A) As regards England and Wales and Northern Ireland, the term implied by subsection (1) above is a condition and the terms implied by subsections (2), (4) and (5) above are warranties."

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
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
